READING CLUB HEARS INTERESTING LECTURE

ProfessorMacClements of Queen's University, Kingston, was the speaker at the meeting of the Reading Club Saturday evening in the High School. His lecture was entitled "Winged Friends and Winged Enand was most comprehensive and interesting.
