The Secretary of State for Michigan has a plan for reducing the cost of collecting automobile fees. He claims the licensing system costs Michigan \$500,000 a year, whereas the cost of collecting the gas tax is \$18,000. The new plan, he figures, could be carried out for \$50,000 a year.
