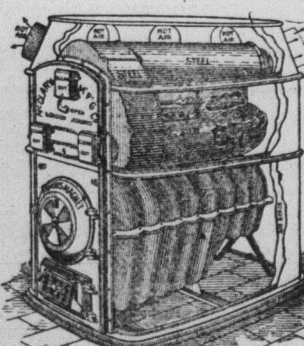

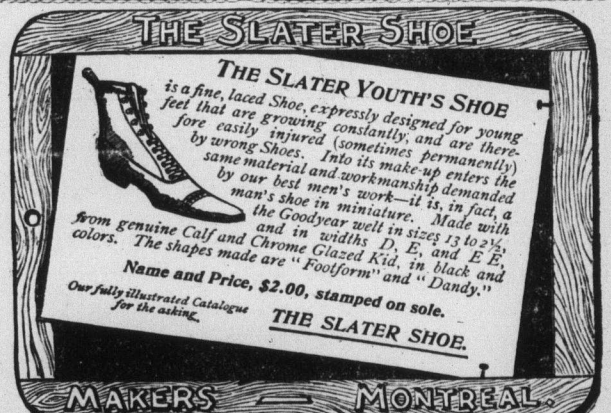

THE TRAMP DEFIAIT.
The Suspected Murderer of Policeman Twochey Shooting Again—A Stern Chase.
London, Ont., June 29.—There was considerable talk on the street yesterday regarding a reward for the man who captures the murderer of Police Constable Twochey. County Crown Attorney Magee, when spoken to about the matter in the afternoon, said: "I think it would be a shame and a disgrace to allow the villain to escape from the country for lack of encouragement to county police, as well as city police. I think a reward should be offered, \$500 at the very least calculation. There are many county constables in Middlesex who might be induced to aid in the search provided there were prospects of some remuneration, but as they have no guarantee that they will receive anything they hesitate. Another thing," said Mr. Magee, "I think the city should give the murdered man's family a good, substantial grant. He was a good officer, and was shot while in the discharge of his duty."

Supped Near Alvinston.
Alvinston, June 29.—The tramp who killed the London constable took supper at Malcolm Campbell's house, four miles from here. Two Watford constables were after him, and exchanged shots with him, one shot passing through his hat. He then coolly sat down on a log and told them to come on, he was better prepared than they were and would not be taken alive. He then went off into the woods. They

stood following. He was seen going further west yesterday morning with a horse.

Petrolia, June 29.—The tramp who shot the constable at London was overhauled close to Oil Springs yesterday morning, but his pursuers failed to arrest him. It is reported he fired several shots, one of the shots hitting a man's hat. The murderer was riding a horse without any bridle and steering westward.

His Capture Imminent.
Petrolia, Ont., June 29.—The telegraph agent at Oil Springs says there is no truth whatever in the report that the tramp who murdered Constable Twochey in London was overhauled there yesterday morning. He adds, however, that there is a well-founded belief that the murderer is in a swamp about seven miles from Oil Springs, and that his capture is only a matter of time.

RAINS DAMAGE CROPS.
Bad News From the County of Essex—Everything But Spring Grain Seriously Affected.
Windsor, June 29.—Reports from different parts of Essex County state that the heavy rains of Friday night and Saturday did great damage to crops. In many places corn was washed out of the ground, and some of it is so broken that it was ruined. The greatest loss will be in the wheat and hay crops. The hay was beaten to the ground, and as it is ready to cut there will be whole fields ruined on account of rust, which appeared as soon as the sun came out warm. In many places it was so lodged that it will be almost impossible to cut it with a mower. The wheat was broken in such a way that it will not ripen and will therefore be a total loss. The spring crops were not far enough advanced to be materially damaged by the heavy downpour. Vegetables also suffered, as in many places the plants were completely washed out of the ground. Tobacco did not escape, as it was only planted recently and did not have sufficient growth to withstand the rain.

Two Tears and the Lash.
Hamilton, June 29.—Stephen Clarkson of Ancaster appeared before Judge Snider yesterday morning, and upon the testimony of his three daughters and wife, was found guilty of an offense for which he was sentenced to ten years in the Kingston Penitentiary, to receive twelve lashes of the cat and nine tails upon the entrance into the institution. Clarkson pleaded for mercy, but as the offense had been frequent during the last ten years, Judge Snider imposed the above sentence in spite of the prisoner's appeals to make it lighter.
