Wrinkles for Housekeepers.

So much information about everything is now so easily obtainable that there is little excuse for enduring many of the small domestic troubles to which housekeepers and others are often subjected.

It is not infrequently of restaurants only who wonder why the simple precaution of throwing red pepper pods or a few pieces of charcoal into the boiler, should prevent odors from boiling.

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Broken china can be mended with a useful plastic made of a piece of old muslin mixed with glue, and the wood of the handle of the garden may be preserved from the weather by coating them with a composition of boiled linseed oil and pulverized charcoal.

Strawberry Jellies.—Take three or four quarts of ripe strawberries, and squeeze out all the juice in a strainer.

The moyenne coloring is to be given to dresses of pale half or four colors of ribbons of three or four colored trimmings down the sides of the skirt, or suggest a vest on the bosom.

Take a pint and a half of fresh berries, bruise them with half a pound of white sugar, and add the juice of one lemon.

Whip up to a stiff froth a pint of cream, with the white of one egg, and add to it two tablespoonfuls of fine sugar.
