" Law, as if he had committed it againft his fellow " Planter : And if any Indian fhall abufe, in Word " or Deed, any Planter of this Province, that he " fhall not be his own Judge upon the Indian, but " he fhall make his Complaint to the Governor of " the Province, or his Licutenant or Deputy, or " fome inferior Magi/trate near him, who fhall to " the utmost of his Power, take Care with the " KING of the faid Indian, that all reasonable Sa-" tisfaction be made to the faid injured Planter.

"That all Differences between the *Planters* and "the *Natives*, fhall also be ended by *Twelve Men*, "that is, by *Six Planters* and *Six Natives*, that fo "we may live friendly together, as much as in us "lieth, preventing all Occasions of Heart-burnings "and Mischief."

A Conduct regulated by fuch Principles of Love and Juffice, could not fail to influence this differing People, and bials them in Favour of the ENGLISH; a Continuance of the like Conduct must attach them inviolably: And the prefent worthy Governor and Council feem so fensible of the Necessity of cultivating a good Understanding with the Six Nations, as to be likely to omit no Opportunity of brightening the Chain, or increasing the Fire of Friendship with them.

The Confidence which these Nations repose in their Interpreter, is a Proof of his Industry, good Sense, and Address: Nothing could have happened more favourably to the English Settlements, than that those delicate Affairs should be in the Hands of a Person equally just and a Friend to both.
