KNOX COLLEGE-BURSARIES.

BURSARIES will be awarded during the session (1860-1) according to the scheme.

I. The John Knox Bursary of £10, (founded by Isaac Buchanan, Esq.) for the best Essay on "The Rise and Progress of the Reformation in Germany, down to the Peace of Augsburg.

II. The George Buchanan Bursary of £10 (founded by Isaac Buchanan, Esq.,) for eminence in Latin and Greek, as proved by examination in the Grammars of both languages; Sallust's Cataline, 1st 30 chapters, Virgil, 1st 3 Eclogues. Acts of Apostles, in Greek Testament, and Zenophon's Memorabilia, Book 1st.

III. A Gaelic Bursary of £5, open to students of the Theological classes, for the best Essay on "The Duty of Prayer and the Encouragements to the performance of this duty."

IV A Gaelic Burgary of £5, open to students of the Preparatory classes, for the best appearance at an oral examination.

The Essays to be given in to the Secretary of the College Senate on or before the first of December.

The Essays must be correctly and legibly written, and with mottes on the title pages instead of the names of the authors.

Macaulay, in his youth, was a frequent visitor at Barley wood, the residence of Hannah More and her sisters. Here his genius was discovered and recognized, and brilliant expectations were formed of his future greatness. In most respects the expectations of this true friend of his youth were realled. The early references to the future distinguished historian and orator, will be read with interest, whno the letters are on other grounds valuable and worthy of preservation.

This volume is of the same general class with the "Missing Link," and " Haste to, the Rescue," and may show the amount of effort that is being at present put forth for the social eleva. tion and improvement of the sunken masses.
