Dr. Bucke, who knew all parties well, says there was no intimacy between Comstock and my sons, nor was there any likelihood of tour being any confidence reposed in the former by the latter, so widely different were they in character, disposition and habits. And if reperie may be read on, Comstock himself told so many different stories in accounting for his possession and sale of the lode that it cans to be believed that he took possession of books, maps and other papers which Arien had boxed up for safe keeping, and thus learned of the existence of the mines they had discovered and claimed them-s metimes as his own discovery, sometimes as having been left in his charge, for which he was to receive ene-third or one-fourth, sometimes as their partner and some imes as being on the spet, and therefore nearer to them than any distant heirs, having the best rightthat of possession!"


