LITERARY GOSSIP.

The new volume, on the Psalms, of Dr. Lange's critical and homiletical commentary has appeared.

A further volume of discourses, by the Rev. Dr. Bushnell, entitled "Sermons on Living Subjects," is now ready.

The completing part of Tennyson's Idyls of the King, "Gareth and Lynette," is published.

A second and cheaper edition of Sir Arthur Helps' "Life and Labours of Mr. Brassey" has been issued.

Mr. Darwin's new work on "The Expression of the Emotions in Men and Animals," is to be brought out immediately.

Justin McCarthy is publishing a series of biographic sketches entitled "Modern Leaders."

Tyrwhitt's "Christian Art and Symbolism" has been reprinted, with an introduction, by John Ruskin.

"The Story of the Earth and Man, a Series of Sketches of the Geological Periods," by Principal Dawson, of Montreal, is announced.

"Aspects of Authorship," a gossipy work on 'Book Marks and Book Makers' is the title of the new volume by the author of "Cues from All Quarters."

Mr. Stanley's "How I Found Livingstone" is to be published at the end of November.

Lord Lytton, the veteran novelist, enters the lists again with a new story, to be issued in serial form.

Mr. Anthony Trollope's new novel, "The Eustace Diamonds," has been published in separate form.

Geo. Elliot's new story, "Middlemarch," will soon appear in complete shape.

A work on "Art Education, Industrial and Scholastic," has been published by the State Director of Art Education, Massachusetts.

Miss Braddon's new serial story, "To the Bitter End," is complete and published separately.

A work on "Recent Scientific Conclusions, and their Relation to Religion" is announced.

The new Boyle Lectures on "Moral Difficulties Connected with the Bible," is ready.

A new illustrated library edition of the works of the Bronte Family—Currer, Ellis and Acton Bell, is in preparation.

The new and popular issue, the Kensington Edition of Thackeray's works, has been completed.

A new re-issue of Charles Knight's "Popular History of England" will shortly be in the literary market.

Three English editions of the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher's recent "Lectures on Preaching," have been published.

A magnificent work on "The Arctic Regions," illustrated with photographs, taken on a recent art expedition to Greenland, appears at the price of 25 guineas.

A volume of "Scotch Legal Antiquities," by Cosmo Innes, F.S.A., is announced.

The second volume of Mr. John Forster's "Life of Charles Dickens," just issued, covers the period from 1842 to 1852.

Cassell's collection of the pithy and witty sayings of the best Humourists, entitled "The World of Wit and Humour," is ready.

MESSRS. ADAM, STEVENSON & CO'S FORTHCOMING BOOKS.

THIS house have prepared their Trade Catalogue for the present season, embracing selections from the large and important purchases personally made by one of the firm in London this summer.

The selections in the new Lists have been arranged under the publishing houses, instead of under the classification of subjects—a feature disadvantageous, perhaps, for general reference, but important in familiarizing the trade with the literary properties of the respective British publishers whose books are enumerated. Appended is a list of American reprints of English works, alphabetically arranged; and a tolerably complete list, classified in departments of study, of the approved School and College Text Books in use in the Province. The catalogue may be obtained through any Bookseller, who will supply any of the Books in the lists the reader may desire to procure. Of the announcements of this house, the following works may be noted as being in press, and those issued in connection with English Houses, as being shortly ready. Two of the works, which are written by distinguished townsmen, will, we are sure, attract considerable attention. The first, an important contribution to the literature of the Origin of Species and the Evolution of Life Theory, by Prof. Daniel Wilson, of University College, entitled "Caliban or the Two Evolutions"; the other a deeply interesting work on the early social life of this city, by the Rev. Henry Scadding, D.D., entitled "Toronto of Old, a Series of Collections and Recollections." Dr. Wilson's work will issue primarily from the press of Messrs. Macmillan & Co., of London, and the Canadian edition is expected to be issued by the end of the year. The book takes its title from Shakespeare's character in the *Tempest*, and from Browning's "Caliban," of both of which, the play and the poem, it presents a critical analysis. Dr. Scadding's
