and similarity, in that respect: that the job was created-when the Confederation started--to see to it that the new
regime would be implemented in a reasonably smooth way.

And things went so smoothly that, after two years, they
could dispense with the Minister of Federal Provincial
Relations!

I think my appointment, at the present time, relates to the fact that not only the whole area of Federal Provincial Relations has increased tremendously in the last fifteen years—in terms of day—to—day relationships between the Governments—but, also, to the fact, really, of the crisis that Canada is going through at the present time—in terms of its unity and the necessity to review, fundamentally, our Constitutional arrangements.

We have, probably, one of the oldest Federal

Constitutions in the world; at the present time in Canada.

It has not been touched very substantially over the last

110 years and I think, after that length of time, it could

that
be quite understandable that / would be time to have a

very good look at it and, maybe, have a new one:

"Try something new"!
