

I am not going to read any more of that, but the point I wish to make is that the pamphlet which my correspondent tells me is being circulated by the thousands in Montreal is issued by the Cartier council of the Labour Progressive party.

I do not want to be political; I am not speaking in a political sense and I do not wish to be taken as speaking in a political sense. I am speaking as a Canadian who wants to do what he can to preserve the freedoms which we possess at the present time. But I am bound to say this: The leader of the C.C.F. party (Mr. Coldwell) publicly has supported political zionism not only in Canada, but in the United States, thereby deliberately inflaming ill-formed American opinion against Great Britain. I have been in the United States during this session, and I have addressed meetings there. The propaganda inspired by zionism in the United States against the British is a terrible thing. Even after the David hotel outrage, the C.C.F. continue to denounce British policy in Palestine as anti-Semitic and elsewhere as imperialistic. Palestine threatens the peace of the world. If Great Britain resists zionist demands to seize control by force of arms, the Jews, the communists and fellow travellers will stir up anti-British feeling everywhere. On the other hand, unless Great Britain refuses further demands for unlimited Jewish entry into Palestine, the whole Moslem world may be driven within the orbit of Soviet Russia. That has been the aim of socialist-supported communist policy in Greece, Poland, Yugoslavia, Spain, Argentina, India, China; while everywhere the lying, blackmailing, smear-bund goes to work, labeling as anti-Semitic and fascist all opposition to this policy. And it all adds up, Teheran, Potsdam, Bretton Woods and Dumbarton Oaks, in place of the Atlantic charter; Zionism, Palestine, Moscow, the Laskis, Baruchs and Morgenthau, and the surrender of sovereignty; the spy ring, the smear-bund, the anti-defamation league, the Carlsons, Winchells, the Philpotts, Haltons, Dyson Carters, Raymond A. Davies and the rest of the red network. The communist Labour Progressive party, the C.C.F. and other fellow travellers all are—

Mr. MacINNIS: I hate to interrupt the hon. member in the enjoyment that he is now having in communing with himself, but when he refers to the C.C.F. as fellow travellers he has to withdraw the statement. Yesterday he said that the Liberal party was supported in the last election by the Labour Progressive party. If that is so, and I agree there are some grounds for it, and the Labour Progressive party did that in opposition to the C.C.F., how can the C.C.F. be a fellow traveller of the

Labour Progressive party and at the same time be opposing the Labour Progressive party? The hon. gentleman should try to put a little sense in what he says.

Mr. JAQUES: At the beginning I said this was not political.

Mr. MacINNIS: That is not the question.

Mr. JAQUES: I am stating only facts.

Mr. MacINNIS: When my hon. friend says he is stating only facts—

Mr. JAQUES: Mr. Chairman—

Mr. MacINNIS: The hon. gentleman says that he is stating facts when he says I am a fellow traveller. As a member of the C.C.F. party I say to him that he is lying.

Mr. JAQUES: It depends on what you call a fellow traveller.

Mr. MacINNIS: Yes, of course.

Mr. JAQUES: My definition of a fellow traveller is this. When a man or a party continually supports the policy of another party, then I say that he or they are fellow travellers of that party.

Mr. MacINNIS: The C.C.F. has never at any time supported the communist party.

Mr. JAQUES: I will put it in this way: the communists and the C.C.F.'s support the same party.

Mr. MacINNIS: They do not.

Mr. GRAYDON: Yes, they do; they support the Liberal party.

The ACTING CHAIRMAN (Mr. Golding): Order.

Mr. MacINNIS: The hon. member never said anything about the Progressive Conservative party.

The ACTING CHAIRMAN (Mr. Golding): Order.

Mr. GRAYDON: The Liberals and my hon. friend's party are in the same bed and cannot get out of it.

The ACTING CHAIRMAN (Mr. Golding): Order.

Mr. PROBE: He should be asked to withdraw.

Mr. GRAYDON: You are in the same bed.

Mr. JAQUES: Let me qualify my statement. Fellow travellers are not confined to the C.C.F.; they are over here; they are in the Conservative party, and I know we have some in our party. I am not including members of the house. Do not misunderstand
