## DRUGS

MEASURES TO DEAL WITH HIGH PRICES

Hon. W. G. Dinsdale (Brandon-Souris): My question is for the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs. Does the hon, gentleman agree with the conclusion of the joint parliamentary committee on high drug prices that the chief cause of the difficulty is at the retail level? If so, when does he intend to use the anti-combines legislation or other measures to deal with this problem?

Hon. Ron Basford (Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs): I am not sure that the phrase used by the hon. member is a correct reflection of the recommendation of the Harley report which recommended that action be taken on several fronts. In line with the recommendation of the Harley committee we are, as the hon. member knows-he asked a question about this yesterday-holding meetings today with provincial officials to discuss certain aspects of the distribution of phar-

know that action under the Combines Investigation Act was taken some months ago in British Columbia.

Mr. Speaker: Order. I notice that several members are rising to ask supplementaries, but again I would request the co-operation of hon, members in an effort to curtail the number of supplementary questions asked between now and the end of the question period.

CROWN CORPORATION TO MANUFACTURE AND DISTRIBUTE—ADVERTISING AND PROMOTION EXPENSES

Mr. David Lewis (York South): May I ask the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs a question which is related to one addressed to him a few moments ago? In view of the minister's justified concern about the high prices of prescription drugs, and in view of certain statements he is reported to have made, will he inform the House whether he intends proposing to the cabinet the establishment of a Crown corporation for the manufacture and distribution of prescription drugs to the end that drug prices might be reduced?

Mr. Basford: I am also reported as having said that, for the moment at least, I have rejected that solution.

Mr. Lewis: I had hoped that overnight the minister had become wiser. I regret being disappointed. I should also like to ask the minister whether he would consider discussing with the Minister of Finance the possibility of amending the Income Tax Act so as to place limits on the allowable expenses which large pharmaceutical concerns and wholesalers may put into promotion, advertising and the like?

Mr. Basford: As has been made clear, we have a five-point program to reduce the cost of drugs and we are meeting with the provinces at the present time in an effort to get some improvement made at the retail level. I believe it would be premature to adopt other maceutical products at the retail level. I am measures until we have had a chance to see surprised that the hon. member does not how effective existing measures are.
