#### INCREASE IN CAPITAL BUDGET OF DEPARTMENT FOR FIVE YEARS—GOVERNMENT POSITION

**Mr. Allan B. McKinnon (Victoria):** My question is for the Prime Minister. The hon. member for Winnipeg South, the former minister of national defence, was able, aided by the Chancellor of Germany, to wrest from a reluctant cabinet a promise to increase the capital budget of the Department of National Defence by an inflation factor plus 12 per cent each year for the next five years. Can the Prime Minister assure the House that this commitment will stand?

**Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister):** I can assure the hon. member that this commitment was made by the cabinet and not by the minister alone. It was the subject of a very firm decision by all ministers in the cabinet, and the former minister does not take that decision away with him.

**Mr. Allan B. McKinnon (Victoria):** I have a supplementary for the Prime Minister.
