employees, not only from the fishing industry, but from all Canadian economic sectors, as the need arises.

An enterprise allocation is a percentage of the total fishing quota that is assigned to a fishing company by the Minister for a specified period. Like all other quotas, they are subject to adjustment, depending on scientific advice on the health of fish stocks.

The enterprise allocation system in Atlantic Canada was implemented on a trial basis in 1982. The system was expanded to include most offshore companies and most offshore quotas for a five year period from 1984 to 1988. In 1988, the Minister announced that the system had been a success and would be continued in the long term.

EA's eliminate the need for fishermen and fishing companies to race against each other to try to catch the maximum amount of fish in the minimum amount of time. EA holders can plan their fishing over the fishing season, supplying processing plants with optimum amounts of fish at just the right time, catching fish as it is required in the marketplace, and harvesting fish with the most efficient vessels and technology. Results have been very positive. Fishing effort has been reduced and landings are now spread out over the fishing season.

Fish processors provide the link between fishermen and international markets. They must have the flexibility to produce products according to rapidly changing market specifications in the most suitable facilities. Community quotas would take away this flexibility and seriously damage Canada's competitive position in these markets.

DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRY, SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY BILL

THIRD READING

Hon. C. William Doody (Deputy Leader of the Government), for Honourable R. James Balfour, moved the third reading of Bill C-3, to establish the Department of Industry, Science and Technology, to repeal the Department of Regional Industrial Expansion Act and to make consequential amendments to other acts.

He said: Honourable senators, this particular order stands in the name of Senator Frith. My understanding is that Senator Frith is quite prepared to let this bill proceed to third reading today. That being the case, on behalf of Senator Balfour, the sponsor of the bill, I move third reading of the bill at this time.

Motion agreed to and bill read third time and passed.
