The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports :—

My exertions during the past year have, to a considerable extent, been taken up in trying to keep our vessel afloat. It has been hard work, and I often feared that, after all my time and work here, the Mission might have to be closed; and yet it seemed too humiliating to think that these people should have to be left without a clergyman, because the small sum necessary to enable me to hold my post could not be made up.

But in addition to the assessment to the Diocesan Board, this Mission has the burden of a Parsonage only partly paid for, and with instalments coming due every year. As the time drew near for paying, I thought it would have to be sold in order to save what we have already paid on it. But finally the money was raised through the earnest efforts of the congregation at the village and at Halesboro'.
