BALKAN STATES' REPLY EXPECTED

Ready to Accept Mediation,
But Terms Are Such That
Peace Is Not Antici-
pated.

Unknown Steamer Struck a
Lighter in New York Har-
bor and Proceeded Out to
Sea, and While Argument
Proceeded, Eleven Men
Died.

OTTAWA, March 13.—(Special.)—
The dissolution talk which had ap-
parently ebbed away, is again at high
tide, and many Liberal members are
declaring tonight that the present par-
liament will die at the close of the
week. On the other hand cabinet
ministers and Conservative members
who should be in touch with the situ-
ation, deny these reports with con-
siderable vigor. It is significant, how-
ever that no attempt is now being
made to hold down the Liberal mem-
bers to the subject in hand; and they
are allowed, in their speeches, to
ramble at will and discuss whatever
they please. For the present week at
least it seems evident that not the
slightest restriction will be placed
upon the endless stream of talk which
flows from the opposition benches
and will continue to flow without in-
terruption until Saturday midnight.

Like the morning star after a long
night of darkness and confusion came
the suggestion of Mr. W. F. Maclean
(S. York) in the house of commons
this afternoon that the two political
parties should find a common ground
upon which to base an agreement re-
specting the policy of Canada in the
matter of naval defence of the Domi-
nion and the empire.

are expected to reply today (Friday)
to the offer of mediation made by the
powers. The reply is expected to be
an acceptance, but with conditions
that will make it impossible for the
powers to act upon it. The question
that will have to be decided is how
the allies can be induced to withdraw
the conditions. It is now regarded
as extremely likely that peace cannot
be made without pressure upon the
belligerents.

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Force Engagement.
The organizers started playing, trying
to drown the uproar, but without
success. After a fierce engagement,
which lasted ten minutes, the stu-
dents dragged or carried not less than
50 students into the streets. Those
that were left behind, finding them-
selves outnumbered, did not re-
sist the fighting, but were discreetly well
beaten.

Mr. Morgan's courier handed the
newspaper men this typewritten state-
ment: "Mr. Morgan goes to Rome for
absolute rest. He will not attend to
business of any sort. His physicians
assure that he will recover his health
and vigor in a short time."

CYCLONE WIPES OUT TOWN IN LOUISIANA

ALEXANDRIA, La., March 13.—
(Can. Press.)—The Town of Provin-
cial, La., 52 miles west of here, was
practically wiped out by a cyclone
which struck there this morning. A
negro boy was killed and 15 persons
were injured.

At the same time Captain Bunt gave
orders for lifeboats to be lowered, and
the ferry boat came to a stop.

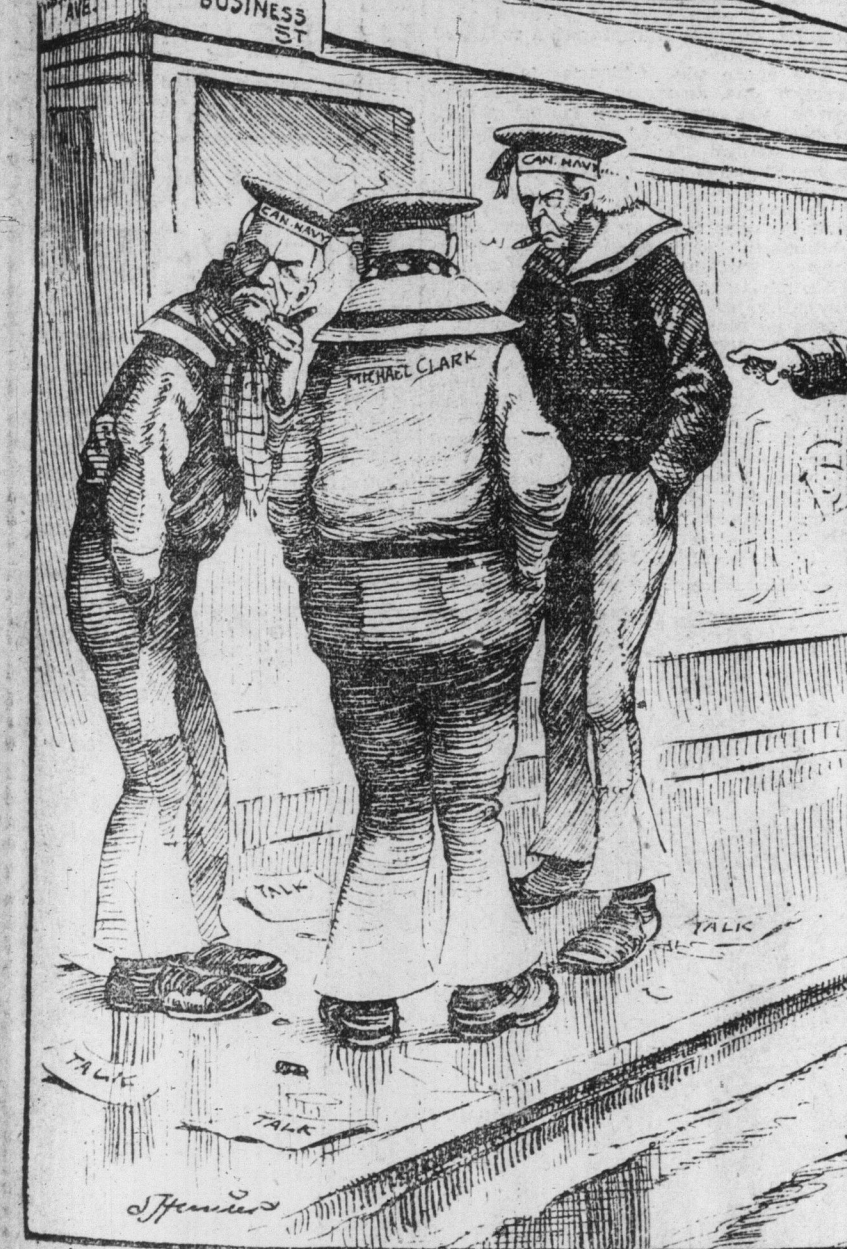
