NOTHING CAN STOP IT

If Union Is of God-Federation Only, Says the Minority.

"It was not to attend a funeral of the Presbyterian Church in Canada that the thousands of ministers and elders came here," was an electric declaration at the general assembly yes-

terday afternoon. Rev. Dr. Scott of Montreal appeared almost astounded at the storm of applause his satirical metaphor caused. Then the rival sides, unionists and federationists, gave opposing roars of applause as Dr. Scott said: "If union is of God, then nothing can stop it." "If it is stopped, it will be proved that it is not of God."

All day the assembly heard the report of the special committee on church union, and the minority report dis-

cused.

The volume of applause in support of the minority report demonstrated that "no surrender" was the spirit of those who refuse to accept the basis of un-ion and that organic union will not be hastily ratified by the chief court of

Presbyterianism.

Rev. Dr. W. J. Clark of Montreal, moved the adoption of the majority report. The majority recommended that the union committee be continued, that it may again enter into conference with the committees of the other negotiating churches.

The minority report was against negotiating churches.

The minority report was against negotiations for organic union, but in favor of greater co-operation of federation with other denominations and the establishment of a federal council

Union in West.

In support of proceeding with negotiations for organic union, Dr. Clark said that the Methodist and Presbyterian Colleges at Vancouver had been

said that the Methodist and Presbyterian Colleges at Vancouver had been working together with a view to union. In many western cities union congregations of Methodists, Presbyterians and Congregationalists had been formed. In Montreal the Stanley Presbyterian and Dominion Square Methodist congregations had sold their sites with a view to amalgamation. Such amatigamation, he said, was impossible without church union.

out church union. Rev. Dr. Herridge, Ottawa, seconded the adoption of the majority report. Rev. Dr. Scott, Montreal, in support Rev. Dr. Scott, Montreal, in support of the minority report, argued in the afternoon the advantages of organic union could practically be attained thru co-operation and federation.

Absolutely Bad.

Rev. R. G. McBeth boldly attacked the church union project as absolutely bad. In seconding the minority report, he asserted that uniformity of ecclesiastical organization tended to destroy

iastical organization tended to destroy spiritual life. This was the experience of European countries where the Roman Catholic church prevailed, and Quebec conditions were similar. A spirit of unity was vitalizing, but organic union or uniformity was the re-

Rev. Mr. McBeth asserted that it was not true that the general assembly at Edmonton last year committed itself to the principle of organic union. Considerable doubt was expressed by the commissioners as to the time when a vote would be reached.

FOREIGN MISSIONS GREATLY EXPAND

Assembly Passes Report to Spend Large Amount Next Year.

Foreign missions were eloqueitly ex-tolled before the Presbyterian General Assembly last night, with the picturesque figure of an eminent foreign missionary as the gowned moderator pre-iding, in the person of Rev. Dr. Mur-doch MacKenzie.

Principal Gandier, in moving the adoption of the report of the committee on foreign missions, said that the year had been one of progress and expansion, with a waster opportunity than ever before now presenting itself,

especially in China.
The estimates called for \$265.393 for the work of the foreign mission board, and \$108,277 for that under the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.




