I have another suggestion to make which I hope will be accepted in the same spirit that my former suggestions have been, and that is, that I would like the School Board to take up the question of encouraging the children in the cultivation of flowers and shrubs. It would be very easy to set aside a certain portion of the school grounds attached to each school and to furnish the necessary seeds; while some person, such as the caretaker, could instruct them. The cultivation of flowers not only has an elevating effect on the minds of the children, but would create an interest outside their ordinary lives, and have a very beneficial influence generally.

The boys, as well as the girls, should be encouraged in this commendable work. Although the seasons are short in Manitoba we all know from personal experience how quickly and well flowers grow. My experience in dealing with boys and girls indicates that half their troubles arise from the want of having some particular interest outside the humdrum of everyday affairs. Anything that can uplift, elevate or engage their minds after school hours cannot but effect good. Trusting that my suggestion will be

received in the spirit in which it is given, believe me.
