Pearl Smith, whose Infant Was Found Dead in Woods Near Barrie, Sent Down to Kingston-Charge Reduced From Murder to Manslaughter.

BARRIE, April 11.—(Special,)—In ne hour and fifteen minutes from the time that Pearl Smith, trembling with emotion, entered the court-room, assisted by Mrs. Beeson of the Salvation Army and an officer of the law, charged with the murder of her infant, the case was closed and sentence passed. She was given seven years in King-

ston penitentiary. Precisely at 4 p.m. Crown Prosecutor Frank Arnoldi addressed the jury, rehearsing the incidents connected with the case, from the time the girl left, the Salvation Army Hospital in Toronto until the time of the inquest on Feb. 9.

The first witness called by the crown was Mrs. Beeson, matron of the hospital, who stated the girl had come to the hospital, and, after staying three weeks, returned to Collingwood with her child. Witness also stated, in answer to a question her child. her child.
