TOBACCO TRUST ORDERED DISSOLVED IN SIX MONTHS

Supreme Court of United States Takes Same Ground as in Standard Oil Decision—Justice Harlan Dissents Strongly From Allowing Re-Formation of Combination in Another Form.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Another of the big trusts was smashed to-day when the supreme court of the United States ordered the dissolution of the combination known as the American Tobacco Co....

The decision in the tobacco case, in the most comprehensive and sweeping manner, sustains the position taken by the government with respect to the decree below. It reverses the action of the circuit court...

Defendants Given Six Months Grace. The court gives an interpretation of its decision in the Standard Oil case, saying that it was there held that in view of the general language of the statute and the public policy which it manifested, there was no possibility of frustrating that policy by resorting to any indirect means...

Opinion of Chief Justice. Chief Justice White described in detail the methods of expansion of the American Tobacco Co., beginning with the absorption of five companies, the absorption of 25 per cent. of the cigarettes in use in the country...

Then the chief justice took up the formation of the Continental Tobacco Co., a New Jersey corporation with a capital of \$10,000,000, later increased to \$100,000,000. This company was formed, he said, after ruinous competition in which the American Tobacco Co. lost \$4,000,000 and forced other concerns to surrender...

Finally he came down to the merger in 1904 of the old American Tobacco Co., the Continental Tobacco Co., and the Consolidated Tobacco Co. into the new American Tobacco Co. Through the method of distribution of the stock of the new company, the chief justice said that J. B. Duke, Thomas F. Ryan, William C. Whitney, Anthony N. Brennan, Peter A. B. Widener and Oliver G. Payne were able to continue their control in the new company...

Applying the rule of reason to the construction of the statute it was held in the Standard Oil case that, as the terms restraint on trade in the Sherman law are in the law of this country at the time of the adoption of the Anti-

Wall Street Apathetic.

\$50,000 FIRE AT \$80 OFFICES AND SUB-ELECTRIC STATION OF LAKE SUPERIOR COKE OVENS BURNED

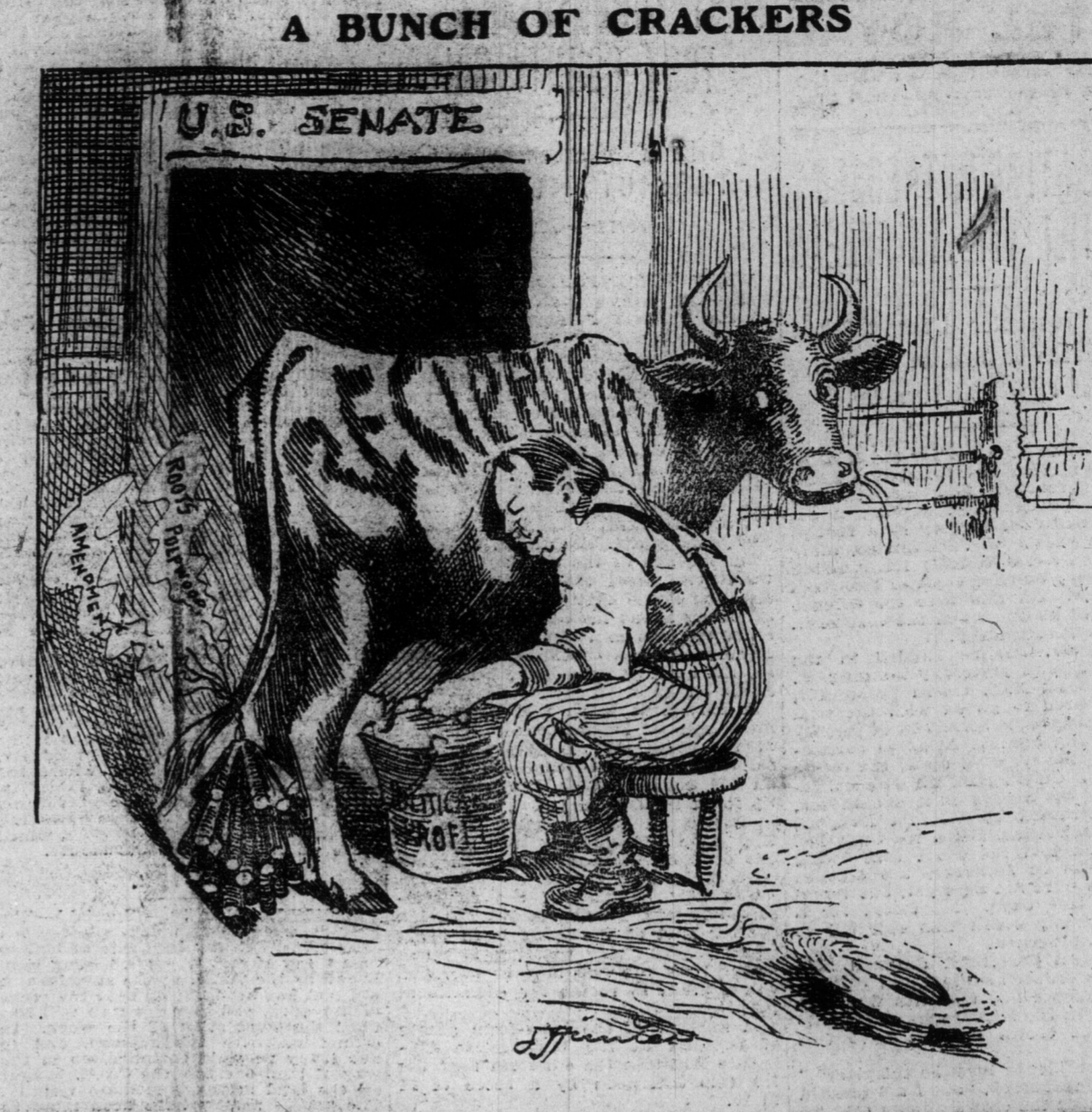
SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., May 29.—In a serious fire at the coke ovens of the Lake Superior Corporation this morning, damage to the extent of \$50,000 was done to the coke ovens themselves, not damaged, but the storehouse, office and sub-electric station supplying power to the coke ovens were destroyed. All that remains of three buildings is a pile of fire brick. Some \$500 damage was done to stock in the interior of the coke plant, and a water tank, which building itself is not damaged to any great extent. The coke ovens will close operations for about 12 hours till the temporary repairs can be placed. This is now impossible owing to the heat over the ruins, where a number of live wires are embedded.

Ald. McCarthy's Reorganization Plan Referred Back by 12 to 11 After Hot Debate on Waterworks Management—Will Force Street Railway's Hand.

City council sat all yesterday afternoon and wrestled with matters of more or less importance, until dangerously near the witching hour in the night. Rules of all kinds restricting hours and procedures were unhesitatingly dispensed with and even then the time flew all too quickly for the civic legislators. Quite a storm raged round the proposal of Ald. McCarthy to reorganize the waterworks department, and finally that radical measure was doomed to await result of the county judge's investigation. The intake pipe was very much up again, and contracts were awarded to the Canada Foundry Co. for supply of necessary pipe and fittings to Miller, Cummings and Robertson.

FIRST CENSUS RETURNS ARE RECEIVED AT OTTAWA 1800 People in Territory on Hudson Bay West of Fort Churchill—All But 200 Esquimaux.

OTTAWA, May 29.—The first census return has been received at the department here. It is the population of the territory of the coast of Hudson Bay, west of Fort Churchill, and the enumeration was begun last fall by the Northern Mounted Police on a special order-in-council. The population totals 1800, of which 200 are whites, mostly Hudson Bay employees and police officers. The rest are Esquimaux. This is the first real census taken in that district. Ten years ago the population was largely estimated upon reports of missionaries and other persons. A substantial increase is apparent. The enumeration of the eastern territory to Labrador was made simultaneously with the other, but has not been received yet. The population there will be much smaller.

SUES FOR BACK SALARY Ex-Public School Inspector Has Dispute With County.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., May 29.—Ex-Public School Inspector William G. Galt is suing the County of Oxford for several thousand dollars, alleged to be his back salary. The inspector was allowed \$5 per school year for inspecting, and when the new school year began he claims that under the terms of his contract he was entitled to \$5 per annum for each department of a school inspected. While in the service of the county he rendered his account on the basis of \$5 per school year, which was paid. After he retired he claims that the county owes him \$500. He is now suing for the claim and suit was entered.

ST. CATHERINES TAX RATE.

ST. CATHERINES, May 29.—(Special.)—The tax rate for the city was struck at twenty-five mills on the dollar, including public, separate and high schools. Estimates adopted provide for increases in salaries to a mayor to \$500; collector to \$400, and treasurer's assistant to \$300.

THE NEW STANDARD BANK BUILDING

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FELDING JOINS LAURIER IN LONDON

Suddenly Cancels Preparations for Participation in Nova Scotia Campaign—Believed to Have Been Sent For—Rumor That Hon. S. N. Parent Will Replace Brodeur.

OTTAWA, May 29.—(Special.)—Hon. W. S. Fielding's sudden and unexpected and wholly unprepared departure to join Sir Wilfrid Laurier in England, marks another of the extraordinary changes which are coming over the political situation here. There is only one explanation of the finance minister's sudden change of plans, namely, that he was sent for that the summons was imperative and that immediate action was the supreme factor in the game afoot. This is proved absolutely by the fact that up to the end of the week Mr. Fielding was working tooth and nail on his preparations for the provincial campaign in Nova Scotia. All his arrangements for participation in the fight for the throne of the Murray government were made. Mr. Fielding was going to Chester, N.S., and the Nova Scotia Liberals were anxiously looking for him. On top of that comes the sudden booking of his passage by the Royal George for a "holiday" amid the coronation activities of London.

AWAITED VICTIM THEN SHOT HIM DEAD

Joseph Jessiman Satisfied Grievance, Real or Fancied, Against James Loughheed by Firing Four Bullets into His Body—Tragedy Witnessed by Dozen People.

A murder which, for cold-blooded deliberation rivals that of the notorious Thaw-White episode, and in which the defence is likely to be the same, that of insanity, was committed in the streets of "The Ward" yesterday.

LABOR CANDIDATES In All Provinces and for Federal House Says Glocking.

OTTAWA, May 29.—"There is a feeling in labor circles throughout Canada that the time has come when labor should be well represented, not only in the federal house, but in the different provincial legislatures," said W. Glocking, Toronto, president of the Dominion Trades and Labor congress, to-day. He said that an organized effort was about to be made to bring out labor candidates in all the provinces, and that the various labor bodies were determined to make the movement a success. It was decided to extend a letter to the various representatives in the various houses to send delegations from time to time.

DOCTOR GETS \$12,500 Middlesex Must Pay Heavily for Accident on Roadway.

Damages of \$12,500 was awarded to Dr. Frank J. Bateman of Stratford, against the County of Middlesex, for injuries sustained when the doctor drove into an obstruction on the Adelaide-road, between Stratford and Mount Brydges, last September, while on his way to a patient.

MILITARY POSTAL CORPS.

OTTAWA, May 29.—A militia gazette to-day announces the formation of a body to be known as the Canadian Postal Corps to provide for the military postal service of the militia at camp and in the field. The administrative control will be under the director of transport. There will be a base postoffice, with headquarters in Toronto, and a detachment in each military division.
