ROOSEVELT HOT IN REPLY TO ARCHBOLD

Continued From Page 1.

Col. Roosevelt's statement follows:

"In the first place I wish to call attention to the fact that even if Mr. Archbold's statements are true, they amount only to saying, so far as I am concerned, that I do not understand I had knowledge of and approved a request for \$100,000 from the Standard Oil Company, which was granted, and a further request for \$100,000, which was not granted.

"Not only did I never know anything of such a request being made, but my unpublished letters and telegram proved to the contrary that there had been a contribution reached me I acted at once, reiterating my demand again and again that the money should be immediately returned if it had been given, and being assured by Mr. Corley that the money had not been received and would not be.

"But I do not for one moment believe that Mr. Archbold's testimony is truthful. He apparently possesses such a regard for the truth that he does not understand the infamously untrue statement he is making against Mr. Bliss. Mr. Bliss is now dead. But during the seven years that elapsed before Mr. Bliss' death, after Mr. Archbold claims he received the contribution in question, Mr. Archbold never brought up any statement of this kind.

"He now says that Mr. Bliss warned him he was making a serious mistake in not contributing the extra amount of money and that later on when the administration began to wish to discontinue the law—for this was all that would have been different if they had done as he asked them.

"This is an assertion that Mr. Bliss was deliberately making a threat to blackmail the Standard Oil into contributing by scarcely veiled threats as to what would happen if they did not contribute. Mr. Bliss in effect told them afterwards that if they had contributed the administration would not have proceeded against them for violating the law—for this was all the administration did.

"This is a wicked assault on a dead man whose highest standing and probity are such that no human being who was himself honest, would ever impute evil motives to him.

"Moreover, Mr. Archbold shows perfectly clearly, as published reports say, that his corporation had contributed in order to get value for its gift and that the gift was made with the expectation of receiving the improper consideration.

"I do not for one moment believe that Mr. Bliss made any such remarks to Mr. Archbold as Mr. Archbold states that he and the late H. H. Rogers visited together on that occasion nor on any other occasion was one word said either by me to Mr. Archbold or by Mr. Archbold to me about campaign contributions.

Tried to Prevent Action.

"Mr. Archbold and Mr. Rogers called on that occasion to protest against any government action being taken against the Standard Oil Company. This was one of a number of calls which Mr. Archbold made to me to try to prevent action against the Standard Oil Company by the bureau of corporations in the department of the interior and by the department of justice.

"If Mr. Archbold had really believed that Mr. Bliss had told him that I knew of any contribution by Standard Oil or had felt that he was jeopardized by having refused to make a contribution or was entitled to immunity for having made one, he would certainly in one of those calls have said as much. He never broached the subject.

Opening of Series of Monthly Floral Exhibitions by Toronto Horticultural Society Was Greatest Ever Held—Entries Came From United States—118 Prize Winners.

In the Canadian Foresters' Hall last night was opened the regular monthly exhibit of the Toronto Horticultural Society, which will close this evening.

The display of vegetables exceeded expectations. Among the collections shown were 13 varieties of potatoes, grown by George Baldwin.

At the close of the exhibition this evening all the displays will be sent to the city hospitals. In all there were 118 prize-winners.

RECORD SCORES DESPITE RAIN

Altho Handicapped by Variable Winds, Competitors at Montreal Ranges Continue Their Good Work.

MONTREAL, Aug. 23.—(Can. Press.)—Shooting thru the rain and somewhat handicapped by a variable wind, the competitors at the P.Q.R.A. meet to-day continued to excel the scores of previous years.

The chief competitors were the active militia and battalion match at 200, 500 and 800 yards, and the second stage of the lieutenant-governor's match, seven shots at 800 yards.

There were also extra, special matches in which some good scores were made. Sgt. Sharp, 2 M.H.B., won the active militia by scoring seven bulls at 800, after making 100 at the 200 and 500 yard ranges. Dr. J. Seager, Aylmer R.A., Q.M.S. Younith, 6 D.C.O.R., and Sergt. H. B. Parker, 80th, followed with scores of 100, while Corporal Buchanan, S.H.C., with 98, and Lieut. W. Seiple, 76th, with 95, were first and second.

The teams of the S.R.R. won both the 1750 and senior team prizes with 579 and 580 respectively.

In the extra series at 300, Q.M.S. Younith, 6 D.C.O.R., turned in two cards of seven bulls and won, with Lieut. Anderson, 8 R.R., second, with 40.

At 500 yards Mr. Andrews, D.R.A.; Mr. "Moreover," D.R.A.; Sergt. McCusker, 8 R.R., and Mr. Spittal, A.R.A., all turned in two cards of possibilities.

At the 600 yard range Capt. W. Drysdale, R.O., won with two possibilities. The results were not officially announced at the 600 yard range, but Lieut. Anderson, 8 R.R., won with 100, and Lieut. Anderson, 8 R.R., won with 100.

ONTARIO MOTOR LEAGUE WILL INVESTIGATE PROGRESS OF WORK ON BRIDGE AT ISLINGTON—ROADS IMPASSABLE.

A great inconvenience has been caused motorists in the city and vicinity owing to the state of the roads around Islington, on the Dundas road. The bridge there is being repaired, and in the meantime a long detour over execrable roads is necessary. The heavy rains of the last few days have made the roads almost impassable. The Ontario Motor League is investigating the question with a view either to have the work on the bridge rushed as quickly as possible or to provide some temporary relief.

Several hundred signs have been erected by the league during the last ten days. The roads that have been already covered, or are being attended to at the present moment, include, Toronto to Port Hope, Toronto to Jackson's Point, Hamilton to Toronto, Hamilton to St. Catharines, front to Guelph, Guelph to Hamilton via east, and a number of roads in the vicinity of Kingston. In addition to "danger" placards have been erected, and a supply of "beware of speeding" signs.

80 CASES ALREADY SENT DOWN FOR TRIAL AT SESSIONS—JUDGE DENTON MAY PRESIDE.

The fall sessions and civil and criminal assizes bid fair to create a record for the number of cases on the lists. Already there are 88 cases sent down for trial at the sessions, which commence Sept. 10. This is greatly in excess of any previous number in former years.

During the first week in September the County Judge's Criminal Court will be held to deal with cases where prisoners have elected to be tried without a jury. It is not known definitely who will preside, but it is probable that it will be His Honor Judge Denton.
