W.M. READE IS GIVEN JUDGESHIP

Berlin K.C. is Elevated to the Position of Junior Judge of Waterloo County.

BERLIN, Oct. 17.—(Special).—W. M. Reade, K.C., today received official notice from the minister of justice of his appointment as junior judge of Waterloo County, and local judge of the high court of justice.

His Honor Judge Reade was born in Orillia in 1854, and was graduated from Trinity University in 1875, and began to practice in 1878 in Amherstburg and Windsor.

In 1886 he came to Waterloo County, where he has since conducted a law practice in Berlin and Waterloo, and in 1898, he was appointed a K.C. in legal circles his appointment is a popular one.

DRY FARMING CONGRESS

International Event at Lethbridge, Alta., for Week of Oct. 21.

The Duke of Connaught will open the International Dry Farming Congress to be held at Lethbridge, Alta., the week of October 21. The interest that is being taken in this branch of scientific farming is shown by the fact that nearly all the agricultural countries of the world will exhibit. Turkey, Russia, Germany will all be represented. The United States Government has appropriated \$10,000 for a federal exhibit. Cups and medals are being donated by the farming journals and boards of trade in the prairie provinces. Lectures will be given every day of the week, and altogether the congress promises to be one of the most important meetings of agriculturists ever held in Canada.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Oct. 17.—(Special).—The body of an unidentified man was found on the cowcatcher of a New York Central passenger train when it pulled into the depot on the American side shortly after 8 tonight. Explosions Acts Of Individuals

Such is Defence of Labor Men on Trial—Evidence Refers to Private Vault.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 17.—(Can. Press).—Lines which the defence will follow in the "dynamite conspiracy" trial were developed today in the examination of Miss Mary C. Dye, Pittsburgh, Pa., and Miss Nora E. Haley, Chicago, former stenographers for the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers.

Their testimony was devoted entirely to the identification of letters which John J. McNamara, secretary of the union, kept on file, and which the government charges implicates the forty-five men on trial in a conspiracy for the illegal transportation of explosives on passenger trains.

In cross-examination, Senator John W. Kern, counsel for the defence, followed the defence's opening contention that the McNamaras and Orville E. McNamara alone were responsible for the explosions. The witnesses stated that McNamara kept a special place for private correspondence which no one in the office was allowed to see. Miss Haley testified that Frank M. Ryan, president of the union, visited the Indianapolis headquarters about once a month.

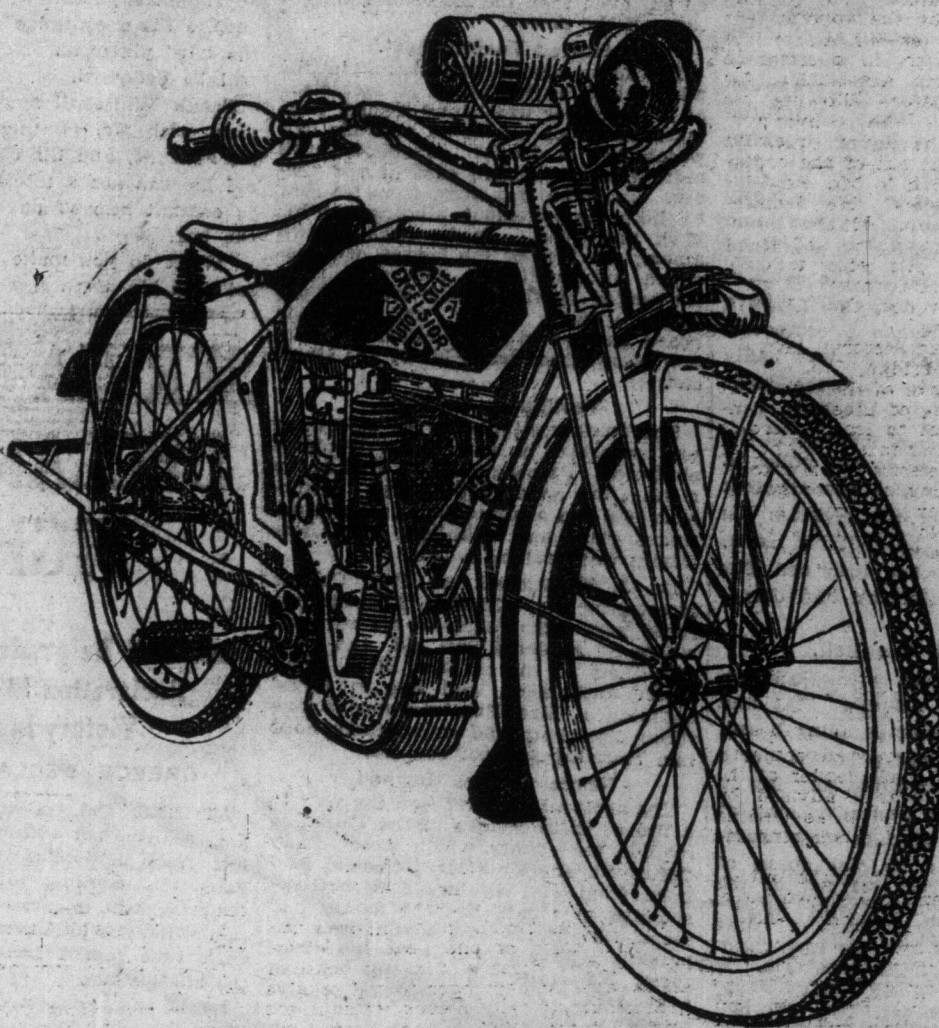

COE'S BODY FOUND

Young Man of North Hastings Drowned in York River.

BELLELEVILLE, Oct. 17.—(Special).—The mystery of the disappearance of a young man, James Coe of McGarry's lat, North Hastings, was cleared when his body was found in the York River, near Bancroft Village, Ont., on Oct. 4.
