NEW G.T.R. OFFICES.

Superintendent of Montreal Terminals is J. L. Gogerty.

Montreal, Sept. 5.—(Special).—The management of the Grand Trunk has determined, in view of the expansion of traffic, the increased importance and enlargement of the yards and terminals both at Point St. Charles and Turcot, the importance of the lines and traffic along the harbor front and the operation of the new elevator at Windmill Point, to create a new office providing for the more complete supervision of these activities.

The office is that of superintendent of the Montreal terminals, including the lines to St. Lambert and Lachine and the Jacques Cartier branch, and the first official to fill it is J. L. Gogerty, who has hitherto filled the position of yardmaster at Point St. Charles.

PICKING UP IDEAS.

Premier Scott Wants Plan for Provincial Buildings.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 5.—(Special).—Premier Scott of Saskatchewan is here to-day, making a thorough inspection of the provincial parliament buildings, with a view to the adoption of the general design and many other features in the erection of the new provincial buildings at Regina, next summer. No decision has yet been reached as to whether competitive plans will be invited or the work undertaken under a retained architect directly by the government.

F. M. Rattenbury, architect for the government of British Columbia, the Bank of Montreal and the C. P. R., has had several long conferences with the Saskatchewan premier and quite likely will be engaged to direct construction of the Saskatchewan parliament.

SCHOOLS OPEN TO JEWS.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 5.—The council of ministers has sanctioned the plan permitting the Jews to open elementary and secondary schools under the same conditions as people of other races.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

CATARACT ARBITRATOR ILL. DANGER OF STRIKE REGURS

Asks to Be Relieved of His Duties, But Company Declines to Accede.

Hamilton, Sept. 5.—(Special).—There may be a strike on the street railway yet, although it was thought a few days ago when the men and the company agreed upon arbitrators that all danger of trouble has been averted.

A new complication set in to-day when William Bell, K.C., the company's arbitrator, wrote asking to be relieved, as he has been seized by a sudden illness, and his doctor told him that he would be confined to his home for several days.

Rather than cause any delay Mr. Bell resigned. The company has declined to accept his resignation, and is quite willing to wait for his recovery. The men think another arbitrator should have been chosen by the company to take Mr. Bell's place, and if there should be a long delay they may tie up the system yet.

Board of Health Meeting. The board of health this evening appointed a sub-committee to interview the firms that were charged in the provincial board of health's report with maintaining nuisances in connection with the coal oil inlet to see what they are doing, and what they will do to remedy conditions. Chairman Quinn entered a vigorous protest against the delay.

At the request of the north enders the sewers committee will be requested to remove the sludge piles at the Ferguson-avenue and Wentworth-streets disposal works.

The late Michael Doran left an estate valued at \$22,000. Rod Harris has sold the Horsehoe Inn to Andrew Frank.

Accepts Call. The Central Presbyterians have received word that their call to Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, Prince Edward Island, has been accepted by him and sustained by the Presbytery. He will begin his duties as assistant pastor of the Central Church at the end of September.

L. Hennings, 38 Cheever-street, charges his son-in-law, William Wells, 18 Cheever-street, under the Charitable Act. The complainant is the accused's 16-year-old sister-in-law. It is probable that the Brantford and Hamilton Railway will make arrangements with the Catear Power Company to use the Hamilton and Dundas Railway tracks on Queen-street and Adelaide-street.

H. C. Crewe, a Toronto engineer, engaged to test the filtering capacity of the filtering basins, began his task yesterday afternoon.

Beachers Incensed. Several months ago the beach residents petitioned for annexation to the city. Their petition was turned over to the Ontario railway and municipal board, which has taken no steps yet to deal with the matter, and the beach people are incensed over the delay.

W. L. Ross announced to-day that he is not a candidate for the city solicitorship, and would not take the office if offered to him.
