ACTIONS AGAINST HEARST NEARLY FIVE MILLIONS

With Other Damage Suits Not on Calendar \$7,500,000 Will Be Involved.

New York, Oct. 31.—The World says: On the calendars of the supreme court in New York County are actions against W. R. Hearst's newspaper properties for libel damages aggregating \$2,400,000, while on the calendar of the supreme court in Brooklyn are like actions aggregating \$500,000. Actions pending in the local United States circuit court amount to \$125,000 more, or a total of \$3,025,000 of libel actions already on the court calendars in these two counties. In addition to this, as a result of the fireworks explosion in Madison-square on election night, 1902, when, under the auspices of Mr. Hearst and his newspapers, a big celebration was held, damage actions in behalf of the persons killed and injured are pending to the aggregate of \$1,449,000. This makes a total of \$4,474,000 of actions for damages against Mr. Hearst and his corporations on the calendars of the courts.

Because of the fact that attorneys do not have to file the calendars only on file notices when the cases are set on the calendars for trial, there are a large number of libel actions which have been brought against Mr. Hearst's newspaper properties which do not yet appear on the court records. Such unrecorded actions, together with the accrued interest and costs on the actions already on the calendars, make it estimated \$7,500,000 involved in the litigation now pending against Mr. Hearst and his various interests.

Such being the situation, it is no wonder, say the judicial nominators, that Mr. Hearst made a deal with Charles F. Murphy in this county whereby he could nominate in such a way as to receive the normal Democratic majority obtained in the county, several supreme court candidates who might reasonably be expected of placed on the bench, to look with a keen eye on Mr. Hearst's interests in pending litigation.

WITH GAS TUBE IN MOUTH

Port Hope Telephone Manager Takes His Own Life. Port Hope, Oct. 31.—G. F. Jackson, local manager of the Bell Telephone Co. here, ended his life about 7.30 this morning by asphyxiation at his residence, Dorset-street. The deceased arose about 7 o'clock and shortly afterwards was discovered by his little daughter lying in an unconscious condition in the kitchen. He appears to have deliberately placed the rubber tube from the gas stove in his mouth and turned on the gas.

IDENTIFICATION OF O'MEARA WITNESSES GO INTO DETAILS

Color of Eyes and Hair and Description of the Clothing Worn.

The charge of perjury against John O'Meara of London was gone on with before Magistrate Denton yesterday morning and the crown produced several witnesses, who attempted to identify O'Meara as the man arrested in Brantford during the Heyd-Henry election of 1907. Several witnesses were positive that O'Meara was the man, but in details as to dress and other points they were not all of one accord. The case was remanded until to-day, when O'Meara's father will be the witness. Magistrate Denton would not accept bail.

Richard Taylor of Brantford, who was outside scrutineer at polling sub-division No. 21, stated that he recognized the prisoner as a man who came to the door and said his name was Augustus Brown. Witnesses told him that that man had been dead for years, but he went in and voted.

By the Color of His Eyes. William J. Graham, a school teacher, had taken a good look at the personator arrested in Brantford and had even gone up the street to study the contour of his face. He wore a fedora hat and a brown coat. He was positive that the personator was the man, also he was wicker now.

Mr. Curry, witness said that he took particular notice of the eyes, giving other features of the man arrested and would swear that the man at Brantford had dark brown eyes and a short black mustache. CATARACT ASKED TO RENEW CONTRACT ON GAS AGREEMENT

Four-Year-Old Daughter of Matthew Hayes Dies Suddenly—Sister St. Felix Dead.

Hamilton, Oct. 31.—(Special).—Helen, the four-year-old daughter of Matthew Hayes, International Hotel, corner of James and Barton-streets, died suddenly this evening after a few hours' illness. The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Sister St. Felix, formerly Miss O'Hara, Chesley, died this afternoon in St. Joseph's Hospital, after an illness of six weeks. Typhoid fever was the cause of her death.

English and Scotch Carpet Manufacturers Seek to Establish a Big Factory Here.

The firms of John Crossley & Sons, Limited, of Halifax, England, and F. Stoddard & Co., Limited, Elderslie, Scotland, has a director of each company now in Toronto, investigating as to the advisability of starting in combination a factory for the purpose of manufacturing all classes of carpets in the Dominion.

C. W. Crossley of Crossley & Sons, who are the largest carpet manufacturers in the world, employing 5000 hands, and Arthur Renshaw, a brother of Sir Charles Renshaw, and head of the firm of A. F. Stoddard & Co., Limited, Elderslie, Scotland, another immense carpet concern, are the visitors, and they are at the King Edward, and preferably at Toronto.

They are desirous of having terms offered them, however, and have interviewed Commissioner Thompson with this object. In England the firm uses a million gallons of water a day, and they require very pure quality. Toronto is not wanting in this respect. It is understood that taxation relief is the form of encouragement sought, but to what extent this would accord with city traditions no one was prepared to say last night.
