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WHAT WOULD A GENTLEMAN DO?

over here in this city. He will therefore present it at the Princess Theatre next week. The comedy had a run of seven weeks in London, and was also successful in Sydney and Melbourne.

The Goodwin Company has been rehearsing the comedy for the past three weeks, and rehearsals are still progressing. A dress rehearsal was held at the Princess on Thursday afternoon of next week.

Since the death of Joseph Jefferson, Nat C. Goodwin has become the American stage. "The Genius," with which he will open his week's engagement at the Princess on Monday evening, is the most popular comedy of the American stage.

The engagement of Rosella Knott at the Grand next week is of special interest, as it will be the first time the actress will have an opportunity of seeing the charming Canadian actress in the improved version of "The Duchess of Devonshire" at less than dollar prices.

Lillian Mortimer, who will appear at the Madam Theatre next week, is a company this season of unusual strength, presenting her last season's success, "No Mother to Guide Her."

Schubert, List and Rossi are among the composers represented, as well as Grieg, in the recital program to be given by Dr. George W. Andrews on the Metropolitan organ on Thursday evening.

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RUSSIAN EDUCATION REFORM

M. Kauffman Submits His Plan—Abandons Old Policy.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 27.—The minister of education, M. Kauffman, has submitted to the cabinet a plan for the reform of the primary educational system of Russia, which, next to the agrarian reforms, is recognized as the gravest problem confronting the Russian Government.

The most important feature of the minister's proposals is one providing for the abandonment of the old policy, which, in accordance with the dictum of M. Pobedonostsev, ex-procurator-general of the holy synod, that education was synonymous with revolution, threw hindrances in the way of the elementary education of private persons to spread elementary knowledge among the ignorant masses of the Russian peasantry, and even imposed a veto on instruction being given in history and other similar branches of education.

M. Kauffman recommends instead that the entire government support materially and morally, all such efforts and assume the payment of minimum salaries to teachers in the popular schools opened by the zemstvos and other local administrations. As the greatest difficulty in the way of a speedy institution of general, obligatory elementary education is the lack of capable teachers, the minister proposes to enlarge, at the state's expense, the number of normal schools for teachers to be educated, and to increase the allowances made to the existing institutions.

In regard to the schools for the non-Russian population, the minister proposes to permit elementary education to be given to pupils in their mother tongue, on the condition that the teaching of Russian history and geography must be in Russian.

London, Nov. 27.—(C. A. P.)—C. H. Beddoe, accountant of the department of the interior at Ottawa, is here on his way to Amsterdam to investigate the affairs of the North Atlantic Trading Co., known as Taylor's Corners.
