Junction Manufacturers Strongly Object to Regulation Forbidding Blowing of Whistles.

WESTERN-AVENUE SEWER EXTENSION

Nordheimer Piano Company Want Town to Sell Them Lot on Hook-Avenue.

Toronto Junction, Nov. 10 .- A special neeting of the Town Council was held this evening, Mayor Armstrong presiding. The clerk had sent copies of the bylaw restricting the blowing of whistles and ringing of bells to the heads of all the industries in town. The replies show there is a decidedly adverse feeling to the bylaw. The Dodge Manufacturing Company says it is "unnecessary legislation." The Wilkinson Plow Companys says: "Such a bylaw always has a detrimental effect. If whistles are to stop blowing, they should be stopped between 6 p.m. they should be stopped between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m." The opinion of the Canada Cycle and Motor Company is "that the number of whistles should be a source of pride to the town." Pugsley & Dingman do not approve of the bylaw at all. The G.T.R. say that it is essential to them to blow whistles in the town. The Laces and Braid Compony say it is immaterial to them whether the bylaw passes or not. Heintzman & Co. say they are not in favor of interfering with the progress favor of interfering with the progress of any industry, and cannot favor the of any industry, and cannot favor the bylaw. The Queen City Mills, thru Arch. Campbell, think the bylaw is a step in the right direction, and cannot see why whistles should blow three times a day. Residents of Westernavenue, who are building new houses, asked to have the sewer extended to their dwellings. The cost is about \$300, and they are willing to pay \$150. Upwards of 700 feet of vacant property on this street would be benefited, the owners of which would not contribute to the sewer, yet, at any time could make connection with it. This was thought to be unfair to those who are building, and a bylaw will be framed compelling all owners of property to contribute.
