NUMBER SHOT IN A RIOT IN TOWN OF BONESTEEL

Threats of Lynching Made, Vigilance Committee Continues Campaign Against Thugs.

Bonesteel, B.D., July 24.—Riot and disorder were again in evidence yesterday, at least four citizens having been shot and several wounded. A number of others were also wounded. The vigilance committee is thoroughly aroused and there are threats of lynching as the most effective punishment to be meted out to offenders.

There are reports of a pitched battle at a suburban east of the town, in which a dozen or fifteen shots were exchanged.

Early Morning Affray.
A serious shooting affray took place about 4 o'clock yesterday morning. S. C. Harrison of Wilkes and a man named Stanbrough, whose address cannot be learned, and two special policemen were shot by a gang of thugs in front of a saloon. Harrison was shot in the forehead, and at first it was thought his wound would prove fatal, but later it was said he was resting easily, and it is now hoped he will recover. Stanbrough's wound was in the leg and will not result seriously.

Round-Up is Made.
A vigilance committee was at once formed and began rounding up the objectionable characters of the town. The station house is full, and arrests are being made every few minutes.

BATTLE FOUGHT SATURDAY HEAVY LOSSES RESULTED

Many People in Newchwang From Households Watched the Fighting.

Newchwang, July 24.—A battle was fought yesterday (Saturday) near Tatung-chiao, attended, it is believed, with heavy losses. The progress of the battle was watched by many people in Newchwang from the roofs of the houses. The day was clear and the smoke of the guns could be plainly seen.

NEWS AT TIENTSIN.

The Japanese are slowly nearing Newchwang. During to-day's fighting it was reported that the Japanese were successful. Japanese refugees arriving at Newchwang have reported that the Japanese gunboats from Port Arthur have arrived at Tatung-chiao.

ARRIVED AT KAICHOW.
Paris, July 24.—The correspondent of The Mail, at Yinkow, says a violent cannonade lasting several hours was heard to the northward of Kaichow on July 22. The roofs of the houses in Kaichow were crowded with Europeans and Chinese looking on. The Russians claim to have retaken Kaichow July 21, and say the light reported was the result of the Japanese re-assuming the offensive.

NEAR KAICHOW.
St. Petersburg, July 24.—Lieut.-Gen. Sakharoff, in a despatch to the general staff, dated July 23, reports skirmishes in the vicinity of Kaichow on July 12. Lieut.-Gen. Count Keller's reconnaissance on the same day showed that the Japanese had only weak detachments at Siakow and Wafanku Passes. There was no change in the situation on the high road to Mukden according to the report, but strong Japanese columns, with thirty guns, were advancing along the left bank of the Taltze River, in the direction of Siakow.
