FUEL ORDER CLOSES MOST OF THE STORES ON SATURDAY AND MONDAY

TO THE FARMER

Saturday is London's big market day, because the farmers have formed the habit of coming to the city on that day to do their shopping, and they bring their produce.

While drug stores are permitted to remain open on Saturday, and grocery stores may do business Saturday forenoon, all other stores will be closed. London merchants are arranging to take care of their Saturday trade on Thursday and Friday, particularly the latter day.

Thursday is a regular market day, and Friday can be made to take the place of Saturday this week.

Farmers are urged, therefore, to come to the city for their trading on Friday, keeping in mind the fact that stores will be closed Saturday and Monday.

TO THE SHOPPER

It is the patriotic duty of every person to assist the fuel controller in his effort to conserve the coal supply. The order issued requiring merchants and manufacturers to close their places of business Saturday and Monday is a distinct hardship to those businessmen. Merchants who had their plans laid for next Saturday's trade have been obliged to make a quick change, but they are doing so cheerfully, knowing that they are making a sacrifice in the interests of the whole people.

The public should realize this and see that their week-end purchases are made on Thursday and Friday. So far as special sales are concerned, and from all other viewpoints, Saturday this week will come on Friday. Keep this in mind—Stores closed Saturday and Monday. SHOP AND MARKET EARLY.

TO THE EMPLOYER

Keeping in mind the necessities of the situation, due to the fuel controller's order, every employer in the city who can do so should arrange to pay his employees so that purchases usually made on Saturday can be made one day earlier, while the stores are open. Thousands of London people have bought furniture, musical instruments and other articles on credit and have arranged to make weekly payments. Most of these payments fall due on Saturday.

The employer who pushes his pay-day one day ahead this week is doing a patriotic duty, in enabling his employees to arrange their affairs most conveniently in conformity with the fuel controller's order.

BURN WOOD, OIL OR DOUBLE UP, MAYOR'S ADVICE

More Misery and Suffering in London Now Than Since Winter Started.

NO COAL COMING IN City Cannot Help and People Must Use Substitutes or Freeze.

More misery and suffering through fuel shortage exists in London at the present time than since the beginning of winter, according to reports that come from the city hall and from the Great War Veterans' Association.

Hundreds of London's families, many of them the children and wives of soldiers on active service, are absolutely without fuel today, and some of them have been securing a most uncertain supply for weeks.

The advertiser called Mayor C. R. Somerville this morning to ask if there was any possibility of relief for the situation.

Situation Serious. "There is a most serious situation to face, and it is deplorable that there are only two courses open to citizens. They will either have to double up, or use no promising coal, because there is not enough coal coming into London or into Canada to keep the people going. They will have to take one of these alternatives."

It is proposed to have Mr. McCallum distribute all the coal that comes to the city. He will issue cards, and the dealers will honor the cards. A card will be allowed to get more coal than he is entitled to get, nor will he be given any coal by the dealers. Mr. McCallum will do all the distributing.

No Easy Task. "This is no easy task," Mayor Somerville today was beset by a steady stream of people demanding coal. He had none to offer them. He could give them no encouragement as to when they would get coal. He advised them to use wood or oil lamps. There was no prospect of generous supplies of coal until the weather moderated.

BOARD MEETS FRIDAY.—The board of aldermen will meet on Friday morning for a few minutes. There is little business to be disposed of, and the controllers will be kept long.

FAMILIES OF SOLDIERS IN LONDON CROWD WAR VETERANS' OFFICES IN HOPE OF GETTING AWAY FROM COLD

Left Their Bleak and Fireless Homes—Seventy-Five Are Completely Out of Fuel—Some Burn Furniture.

The wives and children of many soldiers now on active service overseas crowded the office at the Great War Veterans' Association this morning to warm their shivering bodies. They had spent the night in bleak homes, stoves fireless and with every prospect gone of securing fuel. Some of them had been for days without fuel, and while Secretary Cumble and Mr. Garlick of the Veterans, worked without a break to secure coal for the cold stricken, they were not able to get a ray of hope up to noon.

Seventy-Five Appeals. On the secretary's desk was a list of 75 soldiers' families absolutely without fuel. The association has been doing good work in providing for the dependents of those who are fighting, and the families have come to rely on the association. Some of the coal dealers have given what aid they could, but this morning it appeared to be the most difficult time of all.

J. W. McCallum, who was appointed by the city council to act as local fuel controller, but whose appointment has not yet been ratified by the Dominion fuel controller, stated that fifteen cases of hard coal had arrived in the city last night or this morning. Mr. McCallum said that he was not sure if there was any possibility of relief for the situation.

President of Canadian Produce Association Declares at Convention Public Has Been Given Wrong Impression of Cold Storage.

The sixth annual convention of the Canadian Produce Association opened at the Tuxedo House this afternoon. An address of welcome was delivered by Mayor C. R. Somerville, who was followed by an address by A. E. Silverwood, chairman of the association.

Dr. W. J. Robertson, who is acting in an advisory capacity at the food controller's office, will address the association tomorrow. He will also address the association of agriculturists for Ontario, who also are in the city.

Chairman Silverwood, in his opening address, said that the sixth annual convention of the Canadian Produce Association will be long remembered for its educational interest and the important subjects which are scheduled to be discussed.

Objections to Reflections. Referring to the assertions of W. F. O'Connor, the high cost of living commissioner, that there was a present excess hoarding of goods, Mr. Silverwood stated that these assertions should be removed from the public mind. He said that the food controller's office had been given a very wrong impression of the use, or abuse, of food.

It is regrettable that a Government official should draw from statistics in all cases. The motion of Ald. Frank Harvey to pass a bylaw to that effect will receive the heartiest support of all the aldermen.

The police commissioners had the question to deal with I can assure you the state would soon be missing," said Chief Williams. In London, according to Chief Williams, the police immediately ordered the removal of the stalls from the cafes there when the population became sufficient to automatically transfer such power to the police department.

Investigations made in the past few weeks by patrolmen has resulted in the arrest of no less than six girls who were found in the stalls. They were all arraigned on charges of vagrancy. Three were sent to the reformatory, and three allowed to go on their promises to lead better lives.

TWO CALLS FOR HELP RECEIVED BY FIREMEN The firemen responded to two alarms since 10 o'clock today. The first call was to 244 Huron street, but proved to be a false alarm. Escaping steam from a furnace caused by the bursting of a hot-water coil in the furnace caused the alarm.

A second alarm was made at 2 o'clock this afternoon to 242 Huron street, next door to the place from where the first alarm was turned in. While attempting to thaw out a frozen water pipe with a torch, the partition was set on fire. Damage to the extent of \$5 resulted.

COLDEST NIGHT OF SEASON BY EIGHT DEGREES

Twenty-One Below Was Registered at the Official Bureau.

WHOLE DOMINION COLD

Only Two Places Report a Temperature Above Zero Mark.

It was 21 below zero in London last night, the coldest of the season by eight degrees. The first night of February saw the mercury drop to 18 below, and on January 21 the report was 11 below.

The record of temperatures since the mercury has dropped to zero or below. There was a great deal of suffering in the city as a result of last night's terrific cold. Hundreds of homes were without sufficient coal to maintain the furnaces going at a rate that would wipe out all discomfort.

The majority of the citizens were able to keep the decided chill away and that was all. Yesterday morning the weatherman reported that it was 10 below. For a short time during the afternoon the mercury got up to four above, but for the most of the day it stayed below zero.

This gave it a good start when the night came to establish the season's record. The cold was not confined to London by any means. But two places in the Dominion, Victoria and Calgary, where they are enjoying a Chinook, report a temperature above zero. All others were below.

The weather man predicts that the weather will moderate somewhat this afternoon, and promises a fair and milder day for Wednesday.

The record of temperatures since the first of the year indicates such weather as has not been known for many years. It consisted in mild weather for the first month of the year, and then a month of the usual January thaw not having arrived. The temperatures for the months of January and February to date follow:

SENT TO REFORMATORY FOR OBTAINING GOODS UNDER FALSE PRETENCES

Former G. T. R. Man Must Pay Penalty for Offence.

Joseph Lenehan, a former G. T. R. employee, was sentenced to a term of not less than three months and not more than two years in the Ontario Reformatory, when it appeared in court today for sentence on his plea of guilty to securing goods from the G. T. R. Railway Company.

Lenehan secured a wire, lamp shades and other articles valued at the above-mentioned amount by representing to the foreman of the employ of the railway company.

Lenehan made a strong plea for leniency, but the magistrate pointed out the seriousness of his offence. Under the criminal code, the obtaining of goods under false pretences, or stealing from a railway company, is considered a serious offence.

LONDON'S BUSINESS LACK OF WATER CAUSE OF HEAVY LOSS IN BLAZE

Three Places of Business Are Wiped Out in Fire at Pottersburg.

ESCAPE IN NIGHT ATTIRE Mothers and Babies Make Exit From Burning Building Wrapped in Bedding.

With the mercury dancing about 20 below zero, eighteen persons, some of them children, were given from their homes shortly after 1:30 o'clock this morning, in scant attire, by a fire that did \$8,000 damage to the Barnes House, Duncan's drug store, and Dart's butcher shop at Pottersburg. Lack of water seriously handicapped the firemen, and the buildings were a mass of flames by the time Chief Atkins and his men got sufficient pressure to make an impression on the blaze. The inmates suffered somewhat from the cold and shock, but no bad effects are noticeable today.

The loss is estimated at \$2,000 on Duncan's stock, partly covered by insurance; \$1,100 on Dart's shop, with little insurance, and the Barnes House, a stock and furniture, with no insurance. The loss on the building is estimated at about \$15,000.

Discovered Blaze. The fire was discovered by Mrs. Alexander, whose husband runs a store in the Barnes House, and was awakened by a noise. She paid no attention to it, but later it was discovered by the firemen.

By this time flames were shooting out of the rear of Dart's butcher shop, and the Barnes House was in flames. The firemen were quickly on the scene, but could do little to check the fire. ice at the front. My Government has co-operated with the Dominion authorities in arranging for the care of the disabled and for the return of others in civil life. It has also developed plans to assist returned soldiers who desire to settle upon the land. In July last an addition to the Ontario military hospital at Pottersburg was completed and opened for occupation. The expeditious accomplishment of this undertaking is a source of satisfaction, as it has doubled the capacity of the institution at a time when hospital accommodation is urgently needed and has given the province of Ontario an opportunity to show her power of development.

Our people participate very earnestly in the widespread sympathy evoked by the destruction of life and property in the Halifax disaster. Steps were taken by my Government to extend help and relief on your behalf to the sufferers.

The Hydro Situation. Increased demands for electrical energy, arising out of the needs of munition plants, have taxed the present provincial service beyond the limit of its capacity. As authorized by this Legislature, the Hydro-Electric Power Commission has purchased the Ontario Power Company, and has taken steps to increase its power development. The construction work on the Chippewa-Quebec project has been actively carried on, with the prospect that when complete that undertaking will render sufficient power available to meet demands for electricity in the Niagara system for some time to come.

In view of the difficulty of obtaining coal, my Government has been carefully considering sources of fuel supply within the province, and has set aside territory known to contain peat deposits, the intention being to make investigations and experiments with the object of rendering the resources available for fuel purposes.

The department of highways has commenced to take a view to provincial maintenance, as a portion of the general fund of highways is being carried out after the war.

The inquiry instituted into the state of public highways in this province has been completed, and the report of the commissioner will be submitted to you.

Public Accounts. The public accounts, showing that the finances of the province are in a healthy state, will be laid before you. Expenses, the intention being to make investigations and experiments with the object of rendering the resources available for fuel purposes.

Measures will be submitted to you to provide for taking the votes so early as possible, respecting the public health; relating to the public service; and necessary to our country in a time like the present, and my confidence that, under the guidance of your deliberations will contribute to the welfare and security of our people.
