ANOTHER PEACE **NOTE IS COMING** FROM AUSTRIA, IS SWISS RUMOR


Report Says if Hertling Has Resigned His Successor Must Sue for Peace.

MOUNT FOREST

Allenby's Cavalry Has Joined With King of Hedjas' Forces.

LONDON, Sept. 29 .- Prisoners to the number of 50,000 and 325 guns had been counted by the British in Palestine up to Friday night, according to an official communication issued tonight. Notwithstanding Turkish resistance in the region of Tiberius, the British forced further passages of the Jordan. To the south British cavalry drove the enemy northward through Mezeribe and joined hands with the forces of the King of the Hedjas. The tex of the communication follows:

"Throughout Friday the enemy of fered resistance in the Tiberius area holding the crossings of the Upper Jordan and positions astride the road to Mezeriba and Deraa. In the evening the Australians forced a passage of the Jordan and Saturday morning drove the enemy from their positions. King Hussein, who had captured the railroad staions at Ezra and Ghazle, north of Deraa, on the Hedias line. Thursday, entered Deraa and Sheikh-Saad Friday, taking 1,500 prisoners. OVER 40.000 PRISONERS IN THREE DAYS IN WEST: 200,000 SINCE JULY 18

PARIS, Sept. 29. - Havas Agency.-French, British, American and Belgian troops in the last three days have captured 40,000 prisoners and 300 guns, it is estimated here.

Since July 18, the Allies have captured 200,000 prisoners, 3,000 guns, 20,000 machine guns, and enormous quantities of material. This does not take into account the operations in Macedonia and Palestine

The above figures do not take into account the additional prisoner. captured on the western front late Saturday and Sunday.

Wilfrid Laurier Wants War Banned Forever.

DEFINES TRUE DEMOCRACY

[Special to The Advertiser.] MONTREAL, Sept. 29. - Before the fifth Sunday Meeting Association of Canada, 'and in the presence of upwards of four thousand people, who packed St. Denis Theatre and overpacked St. Dems Theater and out flowed the aisles, Sir Wilfrid Laurier tonight set forth, in the course of a speech lasting for over an hour, his gospel as to the relations of the nations after the war, and as to the relations of the people which formed these nations for the years to come. A league of nations, which at first might only comprise the present Entente, Great Britain, France, Italy, Deigium, Serbia, and—last, but by no means least—the great democracy of the United States, to be complete and utterly prevent—war must leave no great nation excluded would be the proper method for the banishing of war forever from the earth.

No Faith in Germany.

"With all my heart," he declared, "I subscribe to that doctrine. There should be a league of nations, so that war may forever disappear from the land. I have no doubt that as soon as the war is finished there will be a league of nations between the Entente as it is today. It will be a powerful league. But such a league, powerful as it may be, cannot stop war altogether, so long as there is a great power flowed the aisles, Sir Wilfrid Laurier

"I have to say," he declared frankly, "that up to the present between the working classes and other classes of the community there have been more clashes than union. There should be more harmony. Use of Violent Means.

"On the other hand, speaking as free men to free men, too often violent have been the methods used to secure these reforms. You may say that the ends could not have been securing saving by violence; but I do not turn my eyes to the dark past. I turn my eyes upon the dawn which, I think, I see already reddening the hills. Capital and labor must walk hand in hand. They are indispensable to one another. We are working for democracy, and democracy means peace and harmony between man and man.

The day upon which I could close my eyes with delight would be the day when I could see a league of nations, consisting of France, my native land, of Great Britain, whence I have drawn my inspiration throughout my political life, of Italy and of the American republic, which has been the beacon of democracy, whose flame has always risen high to heaven. That would indeed be a day on which to rejoice. It would be an example not for the nations only, but for individuals, that is the ideal I hold up to my fellow-countrymen."

honor Sir Wilfrid war, and of which he was last night elected the first honorary member, comprises representatives of all the railway brotherhoods and organizations of Canada, and the bulk of the audience tonight was English-speaking. Loud and prolonged applause greeted his entering; his address was punctuated plentifully by applause, and the motion of thanks tendered to him at the close was passed with a thunder of cheering which filled the vaulted theatre. He was introduced by Chairman Woodworth of the association, and by Mayor Mederic Martin, to whose address he replied brifly and wittily in French. A Champion of Labor.

In the nature of concrete proposals he found that most of the program laid out in the constitution of the association "appealed to his liberal tastes."
