#### ST. LOUIS, Sept. 5.-In two addresses here today President Wilson discussed at length points of dispute of the peace treaty, and invited those who oppose treaty, and invited those who oppose them to prove whether they "are not absolute, contemptible quitters if they do not see the game through." The president defended the Shantung provision as the only solution possible by which China can be assisted in her effort to regain control of Shantung Province. The president's first address was at a chamber of commerce luncheon. Tonight he spoke in the Colliseum, where, in 1916, he was renominated for the presidency.

The proposal was offered by Senator Curtis, Republican, Kansas, who declared the experience of prohibition states showed that only under mandatory jail sentences could the small dealers be driven out of the liquor business.
