SECOND JURY FAILS TO AGREE, SO TWO MEN GO UNTIL JUNE

William Andrews, Charged With Stealing Cases of Whiskey, Bailed.

SMITH NOT YET HEARD

Case of Frank Cahill, Alleged To Have Taken Ring, Up Today.

Jury disagreements are contagious. Friday night a disagreement of ten for conviction against two for acquittal resulted in the Winler case, in which Jacob and Harry Winler were charged with theft and receiving of stolen goods, going over for a new trial next June.

The case of William Andrews, charged with stealing three cases of whiskey from a Canadian Express car, will also be retried next June. The jury, after being out two hours and a quarter, returned to ask for information as to how certain evidence should be considered. A little later the jurors returned to report inability to agree upon a verdict. Asked by Judge Macdonald if an agreement might not be possible if a further effort were made, the foreman replied that the disagreement had stood five to seven, but had changed to an even worse deadlock of six to six. Andrews was released on bail, and Joseph Smith freed on his own recognizance. The prosecution had not decided whether to proceed with Smith's case. Charged with the same offence as Andrews, Smith's prosecution hinged largely on the result of Andrews' trial. If Andrews was freed, there was some question whether Smith's trial would go on. If Andrews had been convicted, Smith would more likely have been tried at once.

ALBERT LEWIS LOSES APPEAL AT OSGOOD

Verdict of \$800 and Costs For Alienation of Affections Stands.

The appeal of the defendant Albert Lewis from the judgment given against him last March was heard in Toronto in October before Meredith, C. J. O., and Hon. Justices Macge, Hodgins and Ferguson. Judgment was rendered. On Friday the 10th inst., judgment was given out, dismissing the appeal. P. E. Bartlett, for Lewis, and J. H. Weekes, for Morley, were present. The verdict for \$800 and costs against Lewis stands with the costs of the appeal added to it. The writ (for alienation of affections) was issued on June 22, 1920, and eleven days later Lewis transferred all his property to his father, Francis Lewis. This transfer was successfully attacked by Morley Weekes, acting for Morley, and the judgment of Chief Justice R. M. Meredith, given at the court house here on the 10th inst., making the proceeds of the property available to pay Morley's judgment. Lewis senior will pay the costs of the second suit.

PESSIMISM USELESS SAYS WINDSOR JUDGE

Rev. Canon Arthur Carlisle Conducts Service At Cronyn Memorial.

Rev. Canon Arthur Carlisle of Windsor, recently appointed juvenile court judge in the border city, conducted the service at the Cronyn Memorial Church on Sunday evening. "Pessimism is useless," he said. "It can be a movement, a moral, or a religious, but it takes optimism and faith to finish it."

He advocated looking into the future rather than the past. Christian religion looks forward and not backward. The greatest thing about the British Empire is not her glorious past, but her splendid future. It is not the history of the church, but the opportunity it has. We will all have to look to the future and not dwell too consistently on things of the past.

ESCAPES JAIL AT HENSALL; CAUGHT ON ARRIVAL HERE

G. H. Pearce Posed As Detective in Search of Ambrose J. Small.

TAKEN BACK TODAY

Sold Overcoats—Was Jailed For Having Gun.

George H. Pearce, jail-breaker from Hensall, was arrested by Chief of Detectives Robert Egerton and Detective Harry Down at 2:45 o'clock Saturday afternoon, soon after he arrived in the city in an automobile. He was returned to the place where he was locked up, early this morning, an official from Hensall having come for him. On Friday Pearce, who gave his address as 93 Fullerton street, London, was in Hensall, where he disposed of a few overcoats. He claimed to be a private detective, and asked High Constable Whitehead to aid him in the search for Ambrose J. Small, the missing Toronto man. When a gun was found in his possession he was jailed.

In the evening a dance was in progress in the town hall. Some of the dancers went down to the cells to see Pearce. It is supposed that someone gave him an instrument to use in making a getaway, for when the dancers departed for their homes, Pearce was gone. About 3 o'clock in the morning he was seen going down the railway tracks.

COUNCIL TAKES OVER SEVENTY MILES OF ROADS IN MIDDLESEX

Bylaw To Increase Jurors' Allowances To \$5 a Day Passed.

The 1920 session of the county council did not come to a close until late Saturday afternoon. When noon on that day, which is the usual closing time of each session, arrived, several bylaws remained to be disposed of, and so a meeting was called for the afternoon.

A bylaw drawn up for the purpose of taking over and designating certain roads as a part of the county road system in lieu of those roads taken over by the Provincial Government to form a part of the provincial highway, received its third reading. The bylaw covered over 22 large sheets of closely type-written. The action of the county will affect in the neighborhood of 70 miles of roadway.

So that the county could secure a loan of \$80,000 to carry on the road work during the year 1921, a bylaw was drawn up and passed. The bylaw provided for 20 notes of \$4,000 each, payable on June 30, 1921.

The Komoka Co-operative Lighting Company was given permission to erect poles and string wires and other privileges along the highway in the village of Komoka. The bylaw limits the contract to 25 years. The county retains the right to move the poles at times certain repairs must be made to sewers or the road.

No trouble was experienced in passing a bylaw increasing the jurors' allowance from \$4 to \$5 a day. This increase will come effective immediately, so that the jurors sitting at the present session, be benefited. The jurors are also allowed 13 cents a mile.

The appointment of J. Laidlaw as trustee of Victoria Hospital for 1921 was confirmed.
