ment. The weather is fairly seasonable,

and the outlook for the crops favorable.

Supplies of native wheat are small.

Rumania—The recent rains reported

were beneficial in a way, but the crops

are suffering from dryness, and good

rain is needed.

Spain and North Africa—The crop

outlook is favorable.

Russia—In the South the weather is

warm, and under this condition the crops

are showing an improvement.
