POLICE COURT SYSTEM WILL NOT BE CHANGED

Inspector Hughes and Magistrate Clash Over Children's Courts -Streets Are Renamed

The city will not apply to the legis lature this year for power to change the police court system so as to have all indictable offences handled by Magistrates Denison and Kingsford, and more trivial cases dealt with by courts

in the police divisions.

There were several reasons why the civic committee decided yesterday to let the proposed reform simmer for an-Magistrate Denison admitted he had doubts as to the advisability of the scheme, and Mayor Oliver, in whom the private bills con mittee's treatment of the city's bill appeared to rankle, avowed there was no use in the city's going to the legislature again this year. The city solicitor thought a "period of incubation" would do the scheme good.

Inspector Hughes, who was present to advocate Judge Linds y's plan of a children's court, was charged by Maistrate Denison iwth having "had a Yankee over from the United States to teach us how to suck eggs.'

The inspector replied with dignity that if the magistrate had been reading the English papers as carefully as usual he would have seen an article endorsing the Lindsey idea. The aim of modern justice was to save the boy; not simply to punish him.
