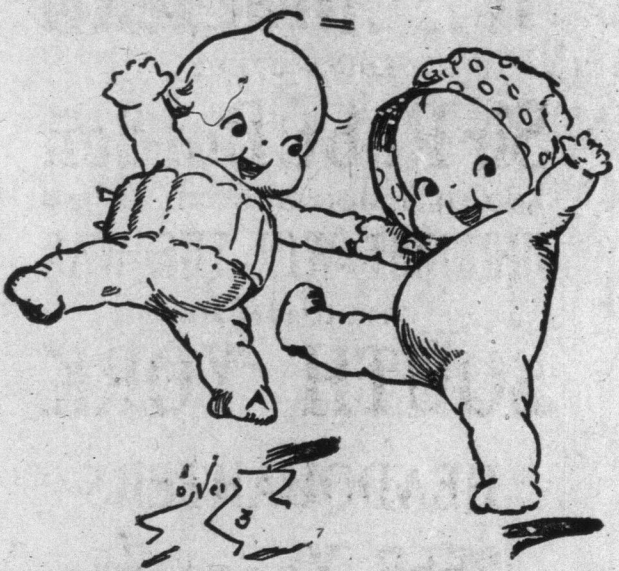

SOLDIERS MAY NOW ATTEND MEETINGS

Major-General Logie Issues Statement Regarding Their Political Activities.

MUST BE ORDERLY

Men in Khaki Required to Maintain Military Discipline Everywhere.

Major-General Logie last night issued a special military order, which points out the attitude soldiers should take in relation to political meetings.

The order reads:

"In view of the unprecedented circumstances now existing in this country, and in view of the fact that the great majority of the younger manhood of the nation is now enlisted in His Majesty's service, and in view of the fact that they are vitally interested in questions now being decided in this country, his excellency the governor-general in Canada was pleased by P. C. No. 3011, dated October 20, 1917, to order that all ranks might attend political meetings outside of barracks, quarters or camps, subject to military law and provided that they should not misconduct themselves or create an unlawful disturbance at such meetings and always subject to the civil power in such cases."

"Soldiers should accordingly be advised that the soldierly spirit, which is one of the principal factors in warfare, depends upon the development of the soldier's character, which must be based upon self-control in the many relations of life, and that the work of making a good soldier is based upon the making of a good man, and results in the making of a good citizen."

"Soldiers are also to be warned that the creation of disturbances at political meetings is an interference with the British right of free speech, and may result in the arrest of the very object for which the disturbance was created."

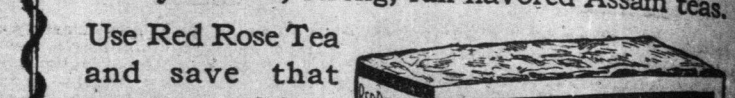
