

MAN-O-WAR MAKES TRACK RECORD AT HAVRE DE GRACE, CARRYING 138

MAN O' WAR PACKED UP WEIGHT AND WON

Defeating Wildair Easily and Making New Record at Havre de Grace.

Havre de Grace, Md., Sept. 18.—Man o' War cannot be stopped. That is the only opinion left after watching the champion pound 138 pounds and win the \$10,000 Potomac Handicap here this afternoon. The son of Fair Play made practically all his own pace and eased up to Harry Payne Whitney's Wildair in the last furlong of 1.44.4, thus clipping one-fifth of a second off the track record made by Uncle Bryn Sept. 22, 1917, when he won the same race carrying 135 pounds. Man o' War was equalled by Midnight Sun and Willis Sharpe Kilmer's Extremist. The latter carried 135 pounds when he accomplished the task.

Man o' War's margin of victory over the other colts today was a length and a half. R. A. Parr's Blazes finished fifteen lengths behind Wildair and was two lengths in advance of his stablemate, Paul Jones, the Kentucky Derby winner.

The largest crowd in the history of the Havre de Grace race course assembled to pay tribute to the champion. The program sales indicate the crowd was one of the largest ever brought together in Maryland to witness horse racing.

Long before the first race the grounds were filled apparently to capacity. Still a steady stream poured thru the gates eager to see the great colt perform, and mysteriously room was found for all who came. Before the race the infield was thrown open to relieve the congestion in and about the crowd took advantage of this, and when the horses paraded to the post the inner fence was lined from the eighth pole to a point a sixteenth of a mile from the judges' stand in the other direction.

Across the track from this group was a deeper one, straining out for the same distance, and the stands were crowded to overflowing.

As Man o' War was led to the post there was an eager outburst of hand-clapping, but it was restrained, many of the present, apparently being quite under the influence of the excitement. The crowd was so packed that the horses would have to pass through the crowd to get to the start.

When the gate went up, he was gone with one mighty bound, racing on the outside position for the first turn. Blazes, breaking fast on the outside under the alertness of Andy Schuttlinger, was inside the champion on the turn, but before the swing into the backstretch he was out of the race.

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THE WORLD'S SELECTIONS AT COLUMBUS TODAY

King's Stake and Review Futurity the Features for Opening Day.

Columbus, Sept. 19.—Horsemen from all parts of the country were gathering here today in preparation for the two weeks' card of Grand Circuit racing which opens at Columbus driving park tomorrow.

There are 28 events on the program, with a total of 543 entries. More than 100 entries were refused last week because they came in too late. Purses aggregate \$75,000.

Tomorrow's program of four events will open with the 2:15 trot, with 19 horses eligible to start. In the King's \$3,000 stake for 2:05 pacers, 13 horses will start, including Russell Boy, Hal M. Mahone and Rod Lanoue.

The stable of Fry and Dahken again provided the winner of the feature at the track when Bobby Allen led through and secured a nose victory over Alvord in the Autumn Handicap, at three-quarters.

Flame proved to be much the best of the Canadian-breds engaged in the initial event and led her opposition at all stages. Langhorne came from behind to score a rather easy victory in the second year-old over a bulky field of pacers.

W. G. Garth's Irish pig showed a smart performance when he led a field of thirty two-year-olds home in the third race, a condition affair, in which the choices Ike T. and Polytha were never prominent.

Mollmurray's Biddie established a new track record of 1:43.2 for three-year-olds and six furlongs, beating the way through and easily won the sixth race from Blaise and Kentucky Blue.

There are eight races on the card today, including a handicap and a steeplechase.
