HAMILTON, March 13.—Early in the week it was learned by the civic officials that an effort would be made by the Toronto-Hamilton Highway Commission to make several amendments to the agreement. It was suggested that Hamilton pay its share of the maintenance perpetually, and that in the estimates, Hamilton would also be called upon to pay its share. The civic officials strongly objected to this and the city council decided to oppose both schemes. A deputation was appointed to wait on the commission when the question was to be decided, and yesterday they appeared before that body and were successful in having the clause regarding the perpetual care of the roadway struck out. An effort was also made by the Hamilton delegation to have included in the roadway scheme the erection of the proposed bridge near the Valley Inn from the high level bridge to Carroll's Point. No action was taken regarding the latter question.

Seventy small mine-sweepers are reported to be continuing their efforts to clear the mine fields, under the direction of officers representing the British and French navies.

"The allied fleets," says The Matin, "will have eight or ten forts and a certain number of great batteries to reduce, but it is the general opinion they will enter the Sea of Marmora within a fortnight if the land forces co-operating with them also can continue their advance."
