SHRUBB AND LONGBOAT

New York, June 8.—Alfred Shrubbs, the English professional distance runner and holder of the fastest running records from 14 to 11 miles, arrived here yesterday on the Caronia. While here he will engage in a series of professional races, and the public will try to induce Tom Longboat, the Indian, to run him a match for a respectable sum.

On board the Caronia on Saturday Shrubbs ran a match of four miles against a four-man relay. The race took place on the lower deck of the ship, which is seven laps to the mile, but the contestants did not show him fair play and he quit after covering 2 1/2 miles.

A SCHOONER HERE FROM
THE COAST OF ICELAND

The Schr Fred makes the Trip in a Month.

The Danish three masted schooner Fred, Captain Gorgensen, arrived in port yesterday, from Stykkisholm, Iceland, and will load deals for Limerick, (Ire.). But few ships from the land in the far north find their way to St. John and a Telegraph reporter went in search of the captain for news. The Fred was found lying in the Wharf, Lower Cove, and Captain Gorgensen quickly responded to a hail. With him was P. Sagurton, the mate, who the captain explained was a native of Iceland and ready to answer any questions.

As to the voyage the captain said they left Stykkisholm, a small town on the coast, on May 9 and made a good passage. Gold mines existed not far from Stykkisholm, the capital, but there was no money to develop them. Many of the islanders had found homes in America, and as many as 30,000 had gone to Manitoba and the West. The weather was too cold to grow grain and potatoes were the principal food product.

The long days in summer and equally long nights in winter are a feature of the far north and the captain mentioned that when the Fred sailed it was daylight from 4 a. m. until 11 p. m. The summer months, July and August, are practically all day light. In the long and dark winter the natives can do little outdoor work except fishing.

The Fred is owned in Denmark by the firm of Carlsson & Mønstel. The captain expects to sail for Limerick about the middle of next week.
