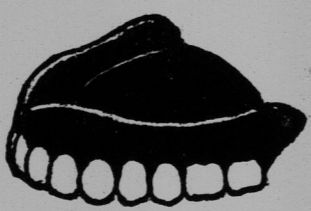

WILL KEEP THE SCHOOL GOING

Ratepayers of Kingston, in Favor of Continuing the Consolidated School.

The three years that Sir William Macdonald agreed to support the Kingston Consolidated school have expired and yesterday Dr. Ingh and Prof. Robertson, who represented Sir William Macdonald, met the ratepayers of the seven districts connected with the school and it is almost a certainty that the school will be continued for three years more.

If six districts continue in the consolidation and the standard of efficiency is kept up Dr. Ingh announced at the meeting that the government is willing to grant \$2,000 per year to the school.

Prof. Robertson stated that the cost of running the school would be \$5,500 per year and that Sir William Macdonald is prepared to give the school \$1,200 per year for three years more which will leave \$1,300 a year to be raised in the districts. A vote of the ratepayers decided to continue the school.

MAY LOSE BOTH ARMS

Sad Plight of a Young Englishman in a London, Ont., Hospital.

LONDON, Ont., April 17—(Special)—Albert Hughes, 29 years of age, has been brought here from the Strathroy House of Refuge for treatment at the Victoria Hospital, where it may be found necessary to amputate his arms.

Twelve years ago, while employed by a London town-ship farmer, Hughes, who had been brought out from England when a boy, was taxed with laziness and in explanation complained of a pain in one arm, whereupon the man determined to use a manure fork, fracturing the arm.

A doctor set the bones, but Hughes always suffered pain in the fractured member, and recently he was attacked by epilepsy, which ultimately affected both arms, rendering him helpless. The farmer who committed the assault on Hughes is now in an insane asylum.

TO FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS

First Sanatorium Established in Puerto Rico Formally Dedicated

SAN JUAN, P. R., April 16—After thirteen months' determined efforts to properly establish the work of fighting tuberculosis in Puerto Rico, friends of the cause had the pleasure of attending the dedication of the first camp—a sanatorium in Santurce, on the outskirts of San Juan.

"What's up, Bill?" he inquired. "Aren't you glad to see me?" "Of course I am," replied Bill, "but, damnit, Bernie, I spent \$65 burying you less than a year ago, and here you are alive and well. What I want to know is where has my \$65 gone?"

Then explanations followed. It seems Bernard has been working near Bangor, Me. Early last summer one of his fellow-workmen appropriated his coat and disappeared.
