O'Neill is a fine catcher, and now that Carrigan is gone, the Boston club could use him all right. If Wood is going to be a winning pitcher next season, the Red Sox will have plenty of use for him, too. Nevertheless, both clubs might see their way clear to make the exchange.

Baker Begins a Banker.

Trappe, Ind., Jan. 11.—Frank Baker, famous slugger of the Yankees, is right on the heels of Bill Carrigan in entering the banking business, but just at present Frank is not talking of retiring. Nevertheless Frank is one of the incorporators of the State Bank of Trappe, Talbot County, Md., which has filed application for approval of its charter. The bank will have a capital stock of \$10,000.

Merkle No Old Timer.

The impression appears to be quite general that Fred Merkle, whom McGraw turned over to Brooklyn last fall, is an old timer as a ball player. This is an error. Merkle was twenty-nine years old on December 20 last. He was purchased by the Giants in 1907 for \$750. It was not long after that he made one costly blunder, but McGraw got a lot of excellent work out of him and there is a lot in him yet.

Scheme to Beat Ruling.

Manager McGraw of the Giants has evolved a scheme for beating the rule which prohibits a major league club from beginning spring training before March 1. He has it said, arranged with Mike Donlin to take some of his youngsters to play in Cuba. McGraw has gone to Cuba himself for recreation, but will no doubt find time to watch these recruits work during the exhibition games for three or four weeks. Some of them will be ordered into the training camp at Marlin, and those who do not impress him as prospects can be turned back.

McGraw was the only one in favor of an early training start, and to see that he, and every one else, for that matter, had no advantage in this respect a rule was adopted by the league prohibiting all clubs from beginning work at the training camps before March 1.

It is not easy to get a true line on the new material in so short a time, and McGraw, it appears, has found a new way which will help some.

Gibbons has been getting heavy and is now said to be at his best at 168 pounds. The proposed Freddie Welsh and Ritchie Mitchell contest is still in the making. Harry Pollock, manager of the champion, is holding out for more money. Arrangements are also on foot for the matching of Pat Moore of Memphis, Tenn., with either Johnny Ertle or Kid Williams on February 23.

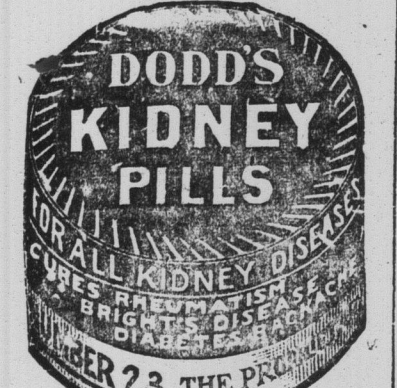
