COUNCIL VOTES
CIVIC GRANTS

Seventy-five Per Cent of Last Year's Amounts and \$500 For Red Cross

Civic grants to the extent of seventy-five per cent of the amounts voted last year were authorized by the common council yesterday afternoon. When the council convened a delegation of mothers of children attending the free kindergartens appeared and asked for the renewal of the grant for that work. Commissioner McLellan replied, promising the consideration of the council, but explaining that the majority of the citizens favored the restoration of the grants.

Later in the meeting Commissioner Wignome moved for reconsideration, but Mayor Prink said the motion should come from the former opposition. On motion of Commissioner McLellan the council decided to take up the matter at a later meeting. Commissioner Potts moved that legislation be secured to authorize assessment each year for the following grants: Horticultural Association, \$4,000; Riverview Park, \$250; and Playgrounds Association \$5,000. There was no second.

Commissioner McLellan then moved for reconsideration on the basis of 75 per cent of last year's grants and this was adopted.

An appeal from the heart by thirty mothers sending children to the Free Kindergarten moved a majority of the commissioners to action yesterday in the restoration of civic grants, and on motion of Commissioner McLellan, the previous action of the council was rescinded and 75 per cent of last year's grants voted to the organizations applying this year. The motion was supported by Commissioners Wignome and Hassell and opposed by Commissioner Potts, the mayor not voting.

The only other business of importance at the meeting was the adoption of a bill requiring licensed junk and second hand dealers to make a report to the police every twenty-four hours of the nature and cost of their purchases.

A bill proposed by Commissioner McLellan requiring all boarding and lodging house keepers to take out a license costing \$1 and to submit a register of their boarders and lodgers to the police was not seconded.

THE SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, March 30—Supplementary estimates, tabled in the commons today by the minister of finance, provide for a further vote of \$6,667,540, of which \$4,630,140 is chargeable to revenue and \$2,037,400 to capital account.

This brings the total amount which parliament has so far been asked to vote for the coming year to a little more than \$127,000,000, or within \$5,000,000 of the total amount asked for last year. The total amount of the main and supplementary estimates chargeable to revenue is now \$123,416,000. Of the expenditure chargeable to revenue the supplementaries today contained an item of \$2,000,000 for pensions and \$1,275,000 for relief of settlers in the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan, owing to the crop failures of last year.

Other votes included \$19,000 to provide for payment of the full seasonal indemnity of members of the house of commons who have been unable to attend either through illness or because they are on active service; \$1,137,400 on capital account for construction of branch lines of the Intercolonial, and a new coaling plant at Lewis; \$500,000 for harbor and river improvements at Port Arthur and Fort William; \$350,000 for Vancouver harbor improvements, and \$175,000 to provide for stamps, salaries, etc., in connection with the extension of the special war taxes.

There are comparatively few new votes for public buildings, the total being only about \$150,000, while for harbors and rivers the total is about \$550,000.
