Court Holds No Criminal Action Lies Because of Lottery Feature

The case of the King vs Walter which required an accounting, was ALMANAC FOR SAINT JOHN, SEPT 29 dismissed this morning in the Circuit by Mr. Justice Bryne on grounds, submitted by defence counsel in argument yesterday, that the whole transaction was tainted with illegality from start to finish and that no criminal action could lie against the
