WALTER BELL IS FREED IN CASE OVER BALL POOL

Court Holds No Criminal Action Lies Because of Lottery Feature

The case of the King vs. Walter Bell, charged with theft and obtaining money under circumstances which required an accounting, was dismissed this morning in the Circuit by Mr. Justice Byrne on grounds, submitted by defence counsel in argument yesterday, that the whole transaction was tainted with illegality from start to finish and that no criminal action could lie against the accused.

J. Starr Tall, crown prosecutor, said that he had read the authorities on the matter submitted by the defence, and felt that they covered the case in this instance, and did not oppose the dismissal of the case.

B. L. Gerow appeared for the defendant, and in his application for dismissal, maintained that the whole matter from its origin violated the law on lotteries, which were illegal under the code, and further that, even if the purposes were not illegal, and Bell and Williams, had had an agreement between them, no criminal action could lie against Bell for alleged violation of this agreement, the proper course being a civil action.

The case arose out of a complaint lodged by Benjamin Williams, who alleged he was joint holder of a winning ticket, with Bell in a baseball pool, that the latter had obtained the prize money amounting to \$800 and had refused to give Williams his share.

There being no further business before this session, court adjourned sine die.
