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### NOW IS RECTOR AT ST. GEORGE'S

#### Rev. John Unsworth Takes Charge of Services Sunday

#### Young Clergyman Had Experience in West; was Through World War.

Rev. John Unsworth, L.Th., newly-appointed rector of St. George's, West Saint John, will be in charge of the services there tomorrow, his first Sunday as rector. Coming to Canada from England when a boy of 17 he made rapid progress in his sacred calling as a clergyman of the Church of England. He has been a missionary in the Yukon and in the prairie districts of Saskatchewan; held a curacy in the Church of the Redeemer, Toronto, where Rev. Canon R. A. Armstrong, formerly of Trinity church, now is in charge, and came from there to Saint John's Stone church as curate. He was made a deacon in 1923 and received full orders in 1924 in Saint John's church.

#### WON ORATORICAL PRIZE.

Rev. Mr. Unsworth's college career at Wycliffe, Toronto, was marked with success throughout, and his winning of the oratorical prize in 1922, showed his ability in public speaking further exemplified in his work in Saint John. He won the Chapman Memorial medal in 1924, when he graduated with his L.Th. degree with gifts from the ministry.

Besides his preparation for the ministry, Rev. Mr. Unsworth has had experience among men as a soldier in the Great War, which he served overseas for three and half years. He has had the training of life in the West under Bishop Stringer and is regarded as particularly fortunate in his understanding of young people.

His address before the congregational of St. George's when that body presented Rev. Rector Dean and Mrs. W. H. Sampson with gifts on their retirement, showed characteristics which have given Rev. Mr. Unsworth ability to win friends and thus to enlarge his usefulness as a minister of the Gospel.
