

PRENTICE BOYS TO HONOR THEIR DEAD

Will Decorate Graves—Procession to Cedar Hill on Sunday.

Tomorrow afternoon the Prentice Boys will pay tribute to the memory of the members who have gone before, and will place beautiful floral offerings on the graves in various cemeteries in the vicinity of the city.

The general arrangements are in charge of William H. Price, Worshipful Master of King Edward Lodge, E. C. Clarke will be the marshal of the parade to and from Cedar Hill, where the principal ceremony will take place.

At the ceremony in Cedar Hill, Worshipful Master Price and the chaplain, William J. Smith, will be in charge, and there will be addresses by Past Grand Master R. J. Anderson, Grand Master L. E. Holton and possibly other visiting grand lodge officers.

The committee in charge of the decoration in Cedar Hill is composed of John Griffiths, Harry Price, Archie Pitt and Leonard Ogilvie. These are all members of King Edward Lodge.

Those who sleep in France also are remembered on this solemn occasion. A list has been made up, and on Sunday morning a bouquet in memory of each of those brave men who gave their lives in the great war and who were members of the order here will be placed in the church to which the soldier Prentice Boy belonged.

After the parade returns to the hall in Guilford street there will be a meeting, and speeches will be delivered and a luncheon will be served.

On next Sunday, August 23, the Prentice Boys will be observed in Marlville, and there will be representatives from St. John in attendance.

INSPECTOR HAD HARD RUN FOR MAN

Tells of Arrest of Sterling E. Dow in Liqueur Case.

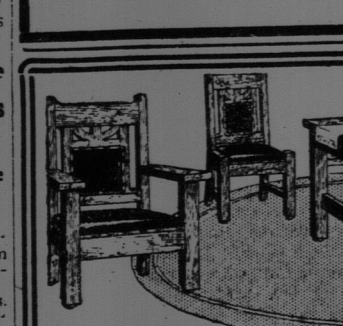
PRESENTATION

WILL TRY TO KEEP SERVICE AS NOW

C. N. R. Official Also Makes Alternative Suggestion at Meeting in Halifax.
Halifax, N. S., Aug. 16.—A. T. Weldon, general traffic agent for the Canadian National Railways, with headquarters at Moncton, who conferred here yesterday with a committee of the Board of Trade regarding the proposed discontinuance of the night train between St. John and Halifax, promised that when he is attended to at the conference in Montreal he will endeavor to have the service remain as it is; if not successful in that he will try for a tri-weekly service, and if he fails in that he will endeavor to have sleeper and express cars for mail from Moncton to St. John, to connect with the Maritime Express from Halifax to Montreal.

SEES ST. JOHN IN NEW DEVELOPMENT

E. R. Gregory Optimistic On Visit From Boston to Old Home.

E. R. Gregory, formerly of this section of the province, but for about 40 years engaged in the building trade in and about Boston, is making his annual summer visit to these good old haunts.

Mr. Gregory feels sure St. John will have taken on its next important phase of development within two years. He has seen the evidence of this in the planning scheme which would have in view throughout its course a panorama of the most entrancing scenery. In this respect Tucker Park would far outclass Rockwood, for, charming as is the circumscribed scenery of the latter, there are but few points on the drive from which a broad outlook can be obtained.

There is, however, no necessity for comparison between the two parks. Each would be supplementary of the other, each in a separate class with its own distinct advantages and attractions—Rockwood a natural ornamental park and its own closed-in rustic scenery; Tucker a recreation park, a great big playground with broad panoramic views for its outlook.

Get Water Frontage.
The Tucker property alone would not provide all the elements of a city's recreation park lacking as it does the important element of water or access to water excepting at one corner within very narrow limits where the conditions are not such as to afford opportunity for the usual pleasures and attractions of a water front. For this reason, it has been suggested in the St. John town planning scheme that the city should have authority to acquire an additional piece of land—approximately 60 acres—lying between the Tucker park property and the Kennebecasis river; this would give to the park a water-front of about half a mile in extent, with a fine sandy beach affording opportunity for bathing at all hours of the tide and every facility for all kinds of water sports.

It has been the object of this article merely to describe the physical characteristics and potential possibilities of Tucker park without reference to the financial aspect of an undertaking of this nature. It goes without saying that this aspect of the problem will be given the most careful consideration by the Mayor and Common Council. It seems, however, that with the small income available from the Caroline Tucker trust fund, a scheme of gradual development under the supervision of a commission, such as that in charge of Rockwood Park, might be undertaken, and in making any capital investment it might reasonably be estimated that the city, through the establishment of the city, such investment might easily become, indirectly if not directly, remunerative in the not too distant future.
