of England burying ground at Oak
Point.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL

Police Evidence of Recovery
of Jewelry in Carleton Case.

Preliminary examination in the case
against Norman Curley, charged with
breaking and entering the store of R. L.
Adams, west side, and stealing jewelry
valued at about \$250, was concluded in
the police court this morning and the
accused sent up for trial. Detective
Biddiscombe said he made a search of
the second hand stores in the city and
found three ordinary watches, two wrist
watches and three watch charms. A
Harris Gilbert also said a man went
into his store and wanted to sell him a
watch but the witness refused to buy
it. The accused, he said, resembled the
man. Sergeant Scott told of arresting
the accused and finding three watches
on him. The accused entered a plea of
not guilty.

pleaded guilty and were remanded. A
fourth pleaded not guilty and said he
had a weak spell but Sergeant Rankine
said otherwise.

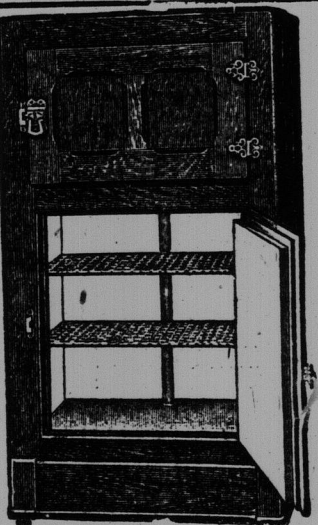

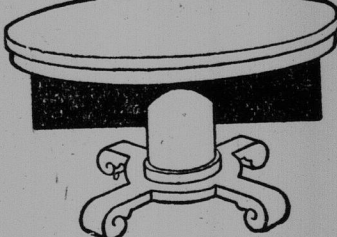
