### RECENT DEATHS

William H. Horn.  
The death of William H. Horn, oc-  
curred at his residence, 19 Elliott Row,  
yesterday morning after a short illness.  
The late Mr. Horn was a native of  
Great Yarmouth, Norfolk, England. He  
came to this country many years ago  
and entered the employment of the well  
known firm of Daniel & Boyd, continu-  
ing with that firm until the closing of  
their business. He was connected with  
the firm of A. Miller & Company, and  
at the closing of this business he en-  
tered the employ of Gordon McKay &  
Company of Toronto, a large wholesale  
dry goods concern, and had represented  
that firm in the Maritime provinces up  
to the time of his death. His wife, for-  
merly Miss Lina Nelson, predeceased  
him a few years ago. The surviving  
relatives are: One sister, residing in  
London, England. The Misses Bertha

C. Mary L. and Isabella J. Nelson, re-  
siding at home, are nieces; there are  
also four nephews surviving, Charles L.  
Nelson, of St. John, Otto  
and William Nelson, of Boston. The  
funeral service will be held in Trinity  
church, of which Mr. Horn was a mem-  
ber for many years, on Thursday after-  
noon at 8 o'clock.  
After a short illness which started

with influenza and later developed into  
pneumonia and scarlet fever, Lucille,  
the only daughter of Hon. Dr. W. F. Rob-  
erts, minister of health, passed away last  
night in her ninth year. The child had  
been ill for about a week and for the  
last few days very little hope was held  
out for her recovery. She leaves to  
mourn, beside her parents, two brothers,  
William and McLaren. The many  
friends of the bereaved parents will ex-

tend to them their heartfelt sympathy in  
their great loss. The funeral will be  
private.

Frederick, N. B., Feb. 17.—While en-  
route from St. John with the body of  
her husband, who died of pneumonia,  
Mrs. Kinman Banks died in Victoria  
Hospital here this afternoon. Mrs.  
Banks was ill upon arrival. Two chil-  
dren survive. Her husband's body was  
taken to Sheffield, Sumbury county.

Dr. Arthur H. Hanington, a dentist  
of Pugwash (N. S.), died in that place  
on Monday. Dr. Hanington was the son  
of the late William J. M. Hanington of  
Shediac and was a brother of the late  
Rev. Canon Clarence Hanington of Nor-  
ton. Thomas B. Hanington of this city  
is an uncle. Dr. Hanington is survived  
by his wife, one son and two sisters.

Joseph J. Orr died at his home in  
Sussex last Friday morning. He was  
sixty-seven years of age and leaves one  
son, three sisters and one brother. He  
was buried on Monday.

CALLS IT "SENSATIONAL"  
The New York World says:—  
"Secretary Lansing's resignation is  
ever more sensational than Mr. Bryan's,  
for in addition to the sudden retirement  
itself there is the dramatic fact that the  
resignation was asked for in most be-  
wildering circumstances."  
The charge of usurpation made by

the president against the secretary of  
state is without precedent in the history  
of the executive department, and the  
country will not rest satisfied with the  
cryptic correspondence between Mr. Wil-  
son and Mr. Lansing. There will be a  
general demand for a bill of particulars  
to explain the president's extraordinary  
action.  
"It has been evident for more than a  
year that the relations between the pre-  
sident and his secretary of state left much

to be desired. Mr. Lansing admits that  
he was disposed to resign long ago. In  
waiting until his resignation was re-  
quested, it is doubtful if he has con-  
ferred any benefits upon himself or the  
president or the country."


