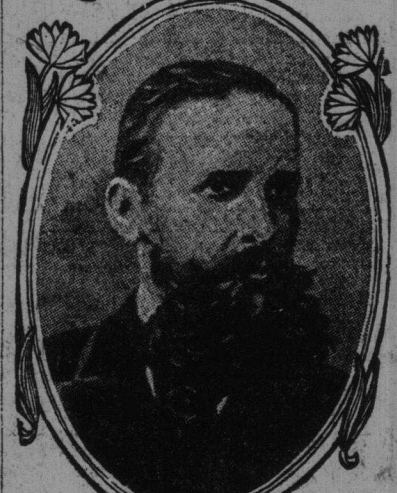
STOLYPIN IS ATTACKED BY AN ASSASSIN

Shot Twice While at Opera in Presence of The Czar

RUSSIA'S PREMIER

Latest Attempt Upon His Life Not Likely to End Fatally—Dramatic Scene in Theatre as Lawyer Sought to Kill Him

Kiev, Russia, Sept. 15.—Premier Stolypin was attacked and seriously wounded during a theatre performance here last night. His assailant was arrested. This is not the first attempt made against the life of Premier Stolypin.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 15.—Stolypin will likely survive the wounds received. He was shot by a lawyer named Bogrof, during a gala performance at the theatre in Kiev. Telegrams to his brother here say that his condition is very satisfactory. The bullet wounded the lungs, and grazed the liver.

The Russian premier, P. A. Stolypin, was attacked while attending a gala performance at the opera house. He was wounded twice, by his assailant. One bullet entered his hand, while the other penetrated the body, grazing the liver, and lodging in the spine.

Emperor Nicholas was present in the theatre at the time. The premier's assailant was arrested. The two bullets were fired from behind. The audience tried to lynch the assassin. The minister of finance, M. Kokovloff, was sitting beside the premier at the time the attack occurred. According to the despatches, after the wounded premier was removed from the body of the house, the audience insisted upon singing the national anthem.

The Czar There

Following his removal from the playhouse, the wounded man slept for four hours, after the first shock of the attack. The first intimation of the probable outcome from these in attendance was that the premier had been dangerously wounded, but probably not fatally.

The assassination was attempted under circumstances that lent themselves to a great dramatic scene. The would-be-murderer, who described himself as a junior member of a firm of lawyers, and the son of a well known attorney and wealthy house owner, chose a moment when attention had been withdrawn from the stage, and centered readily upon his first unexpected move.

The curtain had fallen on the second act, and there was a buzz of conversation throughout the audience, when it was suddenly thrown into a panic. The day was one of festivities, in which the Emperor Nicholas and others of the imperial family had personally participated and promised to end most happily. The opera was a gala performance and the imperial box was occupied by Emperor Nicholas, the heir apparent, Grand Duke Alexis, a youth of seven years, the emperor's daughters, the Grand Duchesses Olga, Tatiana, Maria and Anastasia. In the front row of the pit directly at the rear of the orchestra were seated Premier Stolypin and his associates in the ministry.

The opera progressed and frequent applause that swelled to a chorus of approval, as the curtain fell on the second act. In the interval, the audience, the spectators chatted gaily in suppressed tone as belittled the occasion dignified by the presence of His Majesty, Premier Stolypin.

pin leaning his left arm upon the orchestra fence, had turned his face to the right toward the center aisle, and was conversing with the minister of war, General Sukhomlinoff. The clock in the auditorium pointed to 11:30, when a young man in evening dress moved down the centre aisle quietly and attracting attention only because he approached the two ministers and appeared to greet M. Stolypin.

There was a momentary hush in the immediate vicinity as curious eyes were turned towards the intruder. It was but seconds later when he drew a revolver from his coat and emptied it seemingly point blank at M. Stolypin. As the report of the shot crashed through the house, there was a wild cry from the spectators who rose to their feet simultaneously, many of the women immediately sinking to their chairs fainting. The crowd seemed panic stricken.

Czar Orders National Anthem

Emperor Nicholas at the first sound of the explosion, sprang from his chair and, stepping to the front of the imperial box, stared in the direction of the wound, the scene quite realising what had occurred. His Majesty with difficulty controlled his emotion. Turning to the orchestra, the emperor commanded that the national anthem be played.

SITUATION GROWS WORSE

Madrid, Sept. 15.—The strike situation in Bilbao and throughout the province of Biscay grows more alarming with each day's developments despite vigorous measures resorted to by the government. Matters have now been aggravated by the depletion of the food supply and tie-up of the transportation system.

Moreover the movement as started in Bilbao is spreading to other centres. Disturbances of a like character to those which necessitate martial law, and the suspension of the constitutional guarantee in Bilbao are reported with increasing frequency from the far distant southern provinces of Malaga, and Sevilla, as well as in the neighboring province of Guisepoon.

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REVOLUTION IN CHINA FAST GAINS GROUND

Chung King, Sept. 15.—The revolution is fast gaining ground. It is believed that no food has entered Chungking for many days, and probably already the besieged are on short rations. Heavy firing is reported from that quarter between the garrison and the rebels among whom there are probably many soldiers. Among the missionaries who had arrived here in safety are the Canadians stationed at Luchow, Mr. and Mrs. C. J. P. Jelliffe, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Ferguson and E. R. Brecken.

Peking, Sept. 14.—Unpublished effects order a large force of Wu Chang troops to leave immediately by the quickest route for Sze-Chuan. Tuan Fang, director general of the Hankow-Sze-chuan railway, is expected at I-Chang tomorrow, to hasten the movement of the troop train. The arrested ringleaders of the rebellion include the president and the vice-president of the Sze-Chuan provincial assembly.

The latter was arrested at Hankow whether it is believed he had journeyed with the intention of fomenting an agitation in Hupui province.

The situation generally is regarded as very severe, nevertheless the unreliability of Chinese reports which are now the main source of information necessitates a suspension of judgment until more complete and reliable information is available.

THE POLITICAL FACTORS

One example of the character of the campaign carried on by the St. John Standard gives the key to its whole method. In today's issue it has this heading in large type:—

"Laurier Seeks Assistance of U. S. Senators Thomas Gore of Oklahoma to Aid Liberals in Reciprocity Campaign—Comes on request of premier."

Under this heading appears the following despatch:—

Quebec, Que., Sept. 14.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier tonight denied the report sent out from Oklahoma to the effect that Senator Thomas Gore, who fought for reciprocity in the United States senate, was coming to Canada at the invitation of the Premier to aid him in his pro-reciprocity campaign. The Premier said that he had heard no definite news to the effect that the American senator would deliver speeches on this side of the line, and that in any event it would not be at the express invitation of the Liberal party nor would he be financed by the Liberal campaign fund.

Anything to beat Laurier.

over. The average yield of spring wheat is estimated at 19.14 bushels an acre for the dominion, which is seven bushels more than last year, and the total yield at 180,928,000 bushels. The fall wheat was reported last month at 17,706,000 bushels, being grown almost wholly in Ontario and Alberta. The total wheat yield of the country is estimated to be 204,614,000 bushels or \$1,849,000 bushels more than last year at the same date. The average per acre is 19.50 bushels or 6.30 bushels an acre more than last year.

For the dominion the yield of oats is given as 398,133,000 bushels, which is 81,900 bushels more than last year's estimate at the same date. And the average for barley is also higher than last year by 7.31 bushels, and the total yield is estimated at 31,520,000 bushels, against 29,388,000 bushels for last year. The estimated yield of spring wheat for Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta this year is 181,535,000 bushels of fall wheat, 3,192,000 bushels of oats, 294,738,000 bushels and of barley, 30,285,000 bushels, as compared with 98,908,000 bushels spring wheat, 1,082,000 bushels fall wheat, 92,201,000 bushels spring wheat, 1,082,000 bushels fall wheat, 92,201,000 bushels of oats and 14,723,000 bushels of barley in the previous year.

Maritime Provinces

In Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, the estimated yield of spring wheat is 1,433,000 bushels, of oats 10,090,000 bushels, and of barley 437,000 bushels; in Quebec, 1,877,000 bushels of spring wheat, 44,613,000 bushels of oats, and 2,280,000 bushels of barley, and in Ontario, 2,163,000 bushels of spring wheat, 14,513,000 bushels of fall wheat, 102,077,000 bushels of oats, and 15,528,000 bushels of barley.

The final estimates of last year printed in the December monthly gave the production for the whole country as 16,610,000 bushels.

Canada's total trade with all countries last year was valued at \$759,094,389. More than half of it, or \$404,137,940 was in trade with the United States. Does that fact lessen our loyalty to the Empire?

NEW YORK GARMENT WORKERS ON STRIKE

New York, N. Y., Sept. 14.—(Canadian Press).—With the exception of about 300 operatives in small shops, whose employers conceded their demands, 10,000 employees of the women's custom tailoring establishment in Fifth avenue are on strike. The strike effects only shops where high class work is done. Their demands include higher wages and abolition of piece work.
