

o'clock, p.m., and knew not whence it could come, that I still waited and prayed and believed. At that hour thirteen dollars fifty-eight cents were handed me. "All I needed, and a little over."

I could mention more cases, but let one suffice. When the preceeding Report was read to the Committee on January 21st., we had no means of publishing it. It was quite too long to send to the Papers, and we could not incur debt to have it published in a Pamphlet form. So I prayed earnestly over the Report, and asked for the means of printing it, if it would promote the interests of the Mission. Five days before the Public Meeting at which the substance of it was presented, I received from an unexpected source—from a friend to Missions, Cornwallis—a letter containing *one hundred dollars*, with permissson to use it as I might think proper. So we "have all and abound." Therefore in thy name, O Lord God! we send it forth! May it subserve the advancement of thy glory, and the best interests of these thy "wandering ones!"
