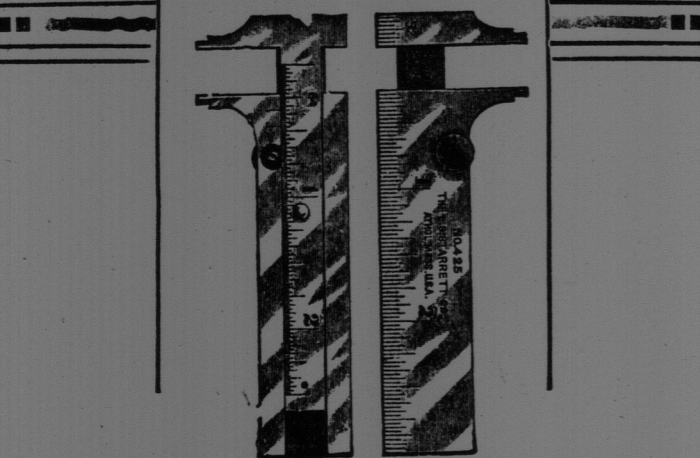

The report fixes the net proceeds of the meet at \$1,421.42, and shows a credit balance on hand of \$244.42 after expenditures had been paid out in sending Charles Gorman to the Olympics, his trips to Lake Placid and Saranac, and in addition to expenses entailed in sending Frank Garnett to the Canadian championships at Toronto and a few additional incidental expenditures.

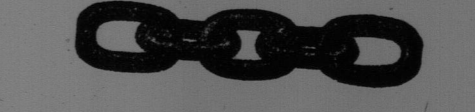
