

TELEGRAPHIC.

Fredericton, May 22.
Mr. Stevens introduced a Bill to establish a Court of Chancery, and a Bill to enable the Bank of St. Stephen to increase its capital stock.

A Bill to incorporate the St. John Trades- Co-operative Society passed in Committee; also a Bill to extend and Act of incorporation of Albert County Bank.

The Secretary announced the receipt of a despatch from General Dyer, saying he has received information that the Union Act was assented to by Her Majesty on the 20th.

The Secretary returned to comply with the request of Mr. Smith to state the names of Senators recommended to Her Majesty, and they would not be called upon to resign their present seats until the 1st of July, when the proclamation will take effect.

In Supply, the House granted \$55,000 to the by Roads and Bridges thereon. Remainder of Supply laid over till next week.

The Bill in amendment of the Railway Incorporation Act also passed. Mr. Connell presented the petition of the inhabitants of Charlotte County praying an amendment in the law respecting rascals in river St. John, and another batch of petitions praying incorporation of Grand Orange Lodge was laid before the House by Messrs. Ryan and Connell.

MONTREAL, May 23.
The Proclamation of Union, issued in England, names July First, as day when it goes into effect.

The dinner to Galt at Lennoxville was large attended; many could not find seats. In reply to the toast of his health Galt spoke of the liberality which had characterized the deliberations of the delegates.

He contended that, with due regard to all interests, tariffs should be assimilated, and that abrogation of Reciprocity had done much to promote success of Confederation.

He further said that one of the earliest measures under Confederation would be the organization of the Militia and the fortifying of exposed points.

The Hon. John Rose, who spoke on defence question, said that we would have to make strong exertions to place the country in a position of security.

NEW YORK, May 24th.
City of Mexico correspondence dated May 24th, says the Bombardment was going on and the city was in a fearful condition. No water was to be obtained, except from artesian wells, which rendered only a scanty supply.

Edred levies of men and loans of money were continually being made by Maximo; \$10,000 a day being required from various business houses, nearly all of which were closed in consequence. \$800 a day was demanded of one family. Provisions were scarce.

The enemy do not care to prevent supplies from coming but they were turned away at the gates by the exorbitant duties demanded by the Imperial officers.

The rumored surrender of Queretaro is untrue—Maximilian was desirous to surrender but Mejia and Miramon, who virtually hold him as a prisoner in their hands, prevented.

ST. ANDREWS, MAY 29, 1867.

THE QUEEN'S BIRTH DAY was observed by the inhabitants of this Town; the public offices and many of the stores were closed—the streets presented a lively appearance with the Volunteers and Battery, whose bright uniforms, reminded us that our citizen soldiers were on hand and ready to defend us.

The Gordon Rifles, (Capt. Stevenson's) under command of Capt. Polley, marched to the Parade ground at Indian Point, where Capt. Osburn's Battery of Artillery, were drawn up. At 12 o'clock a Royal Salute was fired by the Battery, with great precision and in excellent time; the Volunteers fired a *feu de joie*; after which Capt. Osburn called for three cheers for Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, which was heartily responded to by the troops, and populace, who had assembled on the ground. The Battery and Volunteers then marched through the streets preceded by music.

At half past 2 o'clock, the Battery had a dinner at the Railroad Hotel, at which several guests were present. After ample justice had been done to the substantial, Capt. Osburn, who presided, gave the Queen, and other loyal toasts, which were drunk with all the honors. Several volunteer toasts were given, and responded to in a happy style.

Among them we may mention Lieut. Col. Wardlaw and the 1st Battalion C. C. Militia. Responded to by Col. Wardlaw.

Colonel ANDERSON, the brave Commander of the Frontier, last year, when it was threatened by the Fenians; by his skill and military knowledge, a force was raised and drilled for our protection. His untiring energy and foresight, had inspired the confidence of the people, who entertain for him, the warmest feelings of respect and esteem. The toast was drunk with all the honors.

"The glory of this latter house shall be greater than of the former saith the LORD of hosts, and in this place will I give peace saith the LORD of hosts." The Rev. gentleman's exposition of the text was a masterpiece, and rivetted the attention of the congregation. He shewed what the glory of Judaism was by the former Temple, and then pointed to the greater glory of Christianity—the first was temporary, the latter was perpetual.

Miss Thompson of St. Stephen, presided at the Melodeon with great taste and skill; indeed the effect was such that it had the tone of an organ; we know not whether she is a "talented and accomplished organist" of any church, but we do know, that Miss Thompson has a command over the Melodeon that few possess; the singing was admirable and executed with great taste.

The Church is newly finished—the arrangement of the pews is judicious, they are roomy and easy to sit in, and a great improvement on the old style stiff "box" pews. The Wesleyans are justly pleased with their new Church, which it is said is paid for, with the exception of the trifling sum of \$80. Their energy, perseverance and liberality, are worthy of being copied.

The Bill establishing County Courts provides that there shall be a Court of Law and Record in each of the Counties of the Province. Charlotte, Carlton and Victoria, one Judge; York and Queens, one; Albert, Westmorland and Kent, one; Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche, one; Kings and St. John, one. The Judges are to be Barristers of not less than seven years standing and to hold office during good behaviour. Salary not less than \$1,000 nor more, than \$2,600. These Courts shall have jurisdiction and hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant and assumpsit, when the debt or damages claimed do not exceed the sum of \$200, and in all action of tort when the damages claimed do not exceed \$100, and in actions on bail bonds given to a Sheriff in any case in a County Court whatever may be the penalty or amount sought to be recovered.

Three terms of the Court shall be held in each year.

EUROPEAN INTELLIGENCE.
London, May 27.

The question whether the death sentences of the Fenian prisoners shall be carried out or not engrosses public attention. A despatch from Dublin states that the jury have brought in a verdict of guilty against the prisoner O'Brien, but coupled with a recommendation to mercy.

It is said that the American minister, Mr. Adams, will interpose his good offices to save McClure from the scaffold.

London, May 27.
It is authoritatively announced that the Government has committed the capital sentences of the Fenian prisoners to imprisonment for life.

The Danish Government has addressed a circular note to the representatives at the Courts of the European powers, denying the truth of the report which had gained some credit that the Prussian Government had entered into negotiations with the Cabinet of Copenhagen, with a view to bringing about the retrocession of the Province of Schleswig to Denmark.
