take charge of the relief of the Orientals living in that city who are now without the means of subsistence. The money has been placed to the credit of his account, and will be expended by him for the purpose mentioned according to his best judgment. In this connection it is interesting to note a telegram forwarded by Mayor Morley to the authorities in San Francisco. It is to the effect that as the fund used in the purchase of the sup plies which were sent from here by the steamer Tellus included a substantial contribution from the Chinese residents, that their fellow countrymen he recognized in the distribution of the food. That this injunction will be adopted there is no doubt. as it is understood that the destitute Chinamen are receiving just as much care and attention as the white populace. Everybody is being treated upon a standard of perfect equality. Race and color make no difference in a situation of this kind.



> The steamship Queen, which sailed for San Francisco direct last evening. had but thirty passengers. These were notified that if they left they would have to run all risk of being able to land. The Seattle office of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company have issued notice that no more passengers are to be taken south until further orders from the San Francisco authorities, and in view of the catastrophe it is possible that the company's steamer arrangements may be a little deranged for a time. The Senator, which was expected on Sunday, having been due to leave the Golden Gate on Friday last, has been reported, and will arrive some time this afternoon. The impression prevails that after starting on the voyage she was interrupted by the city officals and pressed into the work of relief. There have been no advices from the company's headquarters in San Francisco. It seems certain, however, that she was not able to get very far away from the Golden Gate on Friday, for had she sailed on that date she would have reached here before to
